Jonathan Ranken Anderson – An Annotated Bibliography

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Introduction

It is quite possible that there is more information regarding the preaching ministry of Jonathan Ranken Anderson than any other Disruption minister. His Sabbath sermons appear to have been taken down in shorthand and then transcribed in full. In the Appendix there are details regarding six hundred and sixty-four of his sermons, extending from before his ordination to within weeks of his death. Anderson was a minister from 1834 to the end of 1858, a period of

twenty-four years. In that time he could have preached around two thousand four hundred Sabbath sermons. There is, therefore, over a quarter of his preaching ministry on the Sabbath still extant.

Though such a large body of material is available, there is currently no detailed bibliography of his literary output and, even more importantly, of the unpublished material, either written by him or transcribed by his hearers, that is now held in the Free Presbyterian Library in Glasgow. This article seeks to redress this situation by recording the information that I have been able to locate in my research.¹ As I make clear in the different sections of the bibliography, a great deal of material is still missing, particularly among the volumes of his transcribed sermons. Much of this may at this juncture be impossible to recover.²

A. Biographical material on Jonathan Ranken Anderson

 Article on Rev. Jonathan R. Anderson, Knox's Church, Glasgow, in John Smith, Our Scottish Clergy: Fifty-six sketches, Biographical, Theological, & Critical, including Clergyman of all Denominations (Second Series, Edinburgh, 1849), pp. 27-35.

This article was part of a long-running series that first appeared in the *Glasgow Examiner* and was later printed in book form. The entry on each minister gave a summary of his career and then an outline of a sermon presumably heard by the editor. The article on Anderson appeared in the *Glasgow Examiner* on 16th January 1848.

2. The Case of the Rev. Jonathan R. Anderson of Glasgow, before the Church Courts with Authentic Documents, Illustrative and Explanatory (Glasgow, 1852).

This is a booklet that was written before the case against Anderson was completed. It provides access to some important documents and gives a considerable amount of detail. It is written from a standpoint that is critical of Anderson.

3. Joseph and William Anderson, *Reasons for leaving the Ministry of the Rev. Jon. R. Anderson, Knox Tabernacle, Glasgow* (Glasgow, 1857).

This booklet was written by two of Anderson's principal supporters during his controversy with ten of his elders over the preaching of John Milne

of Perth. These two men subsequently left Anderson's ministry and explain in this booklet their reasons for doing so.

4. William Ewing (ed.), Annals of the Free Church of Scotland, 1843-1900 (2 vols. Edinburgh, 1914), Vol. 1, p. 84.

The account of Anderson in the Annals contains a very significant inaccuracy: it states that he was "suspended sine die, 1852, for professing theological views that were held not to be in conformity with the Confession of Faith". That statement is quite simply wrong. See the articles by the writer in Scottish Reformation Society Historical Journal (SRSHJ), Vols. 4 and 5, which detail at length the Free Church case against Anderson. At no time was he ever charged with views contrary to the Westminster Confession of Faith. Whatever criticism may be made of Anderson, that he held non-Confessional views is not one of them. He was a sturdy defender of the entire Confession.

The printing of this address by John Parker, the son of Gavin Parker, in the *Free Presbyterian Magazine* is quite surprising. Though Anderson's congregation joined the Free Presbyterian Church in 1895, the majority of the congregation left the Free Presbyterian Church after less than two and a half years and became again a separate congregation. They did this because they did not regard the Free Presbyterian Church as maintaining Anderson's testimony. The John Knox Free Presbyterian congregation was required to leave the John Knox's Tabernacle building in Margaret Street, Glasgow, and find an alternative place of worship. Though a few of the congregation returned to the Free Presbyterian Church, the majority did not. This lecture was given to the seceders from the Free Presbyterian Church in the Margaret Street building that Rev. James Sinclair and those who supported the Free Presbyterians had had to leave. The publishing of this lecture is all the more surprising when it is appreciated that Sinclair was the editor of the *Free Presbyterian Magazine*. A note to the lecture states that the address was published at special request.

7. Neil Cameron, Extracts from Diary of the late Rev. Jonathan Ranken Anderson, with a sketch of his life (Glasgow, 1914).

Rev. Neil Cameron's biographical sketch of Anderson is the first significant outline of his career that was written; all later accounts are of necessity indebted to this one. Cameron had the advantage of speaking to Anderson's son and other members of his family. The volume includes an appreciation of Anderson by J. C. Philpot, and a short account of the death of Anderson's first wife, using information extracted from two letters in *Soul Counsel* along with excerpts from Anderson's Diary. It appears that Anderson's grandson, Robert Wodrow Anderson, was in some way involved in the publication. The *Free Presbyterian Magazine*, Vol. 30, p. 117, stated that he was offering copies freely to those who applied to him.

8. James S. Sinclair, A review of Neil Cameron, *Extracts from Diary of* the late Rev. Jonathan Ranken Anderson, with a sketch of his life, in the Free Presbyterian Magazine, Vol. 19 (August 1914), pp. 160-162.

This is an interesting and sympathetic review by Sinclair of Neil Cameron's book.

 Mrs. M. Anderson and Neil Cameron, "The Late Mr. Jonathan Anderson, Writer, Glasgow", in the *Free Presbyterian Magazine*, Vol. 22 (December 1917), pp. 289-291.

This is a notice following the death of Jonathan Ranken Anderson's sixth child and third son. The notice is written by his wife with a short addition by Neil Cameron. Jonathan Anderson led the separation of the majority of Ranken Anderson's old congregation from James Sinclair's John Knox's Free Presbyterian Church in 1898. It is clear from this notice that before his death he attended the St. Jude's congregation as often as his health permitted.

10. Herbert Baston Pitt, "Sketch of the Life of the late Rev. Jonathan Ranken Anderson, Minister of the Gospel in Glasgow", in *Life* and Sermons of the Late Rev. J. R. Anderson, Volume 1 (Glasgow, 1934), pp. 6-22.

This volume contains Pitt's first sketch of Anderson's life and career. It is 17 pages in length and is heavily dependent on Neil Cameron's account (No. 7 above). Anderson's grandson, Robert Wodrow Anderson, seems to have been associated with Herbert Pitt in the publication of this book, see the *Free Presbyterian Magazine*, Vol. 39, pp. 393 and 475.

11. Herbert Baston Pitt, "Sketch of the Life of the late Rev. Jonathan Ranken Anderson, Minister of the Gospel in Glasgow", in *Life* and Sermons of the Late Rev. J. R. Anderson, Volume 2 (Glasgow, 1937), pp. 6-48.

The sketch of Anderson's life, along with Diary extracts, is enlarged to 42 pages. See the review in the *Free Presbyterian Magazine*, Vol. 42, p. 355. Anderson's grandson, Robert Wodrow Anderson, was again associated with Pitt in its publication and distribution.

12. Notes from Letters. These are excerpts from Anderson's letters to his first wife, Martha Freer, and his second wife, Ann Alisa Alison,

in the *Free Presbyterian Magazine*, Vol. 79 (October and December 1974), pp. 306-308, 365-370.

This volume of the *Free Presbyterian Magazine* appears to be the only source for these important letters. It would be a significant step in detailing Anderson's career if the original letters from which these excerpts were taken could be located.

B. Material written by Jonathan Ranken Anderson and published during his lifetime

Several of the items in this section are extremely rare, in particular those numbered 7, 8, 10, 11, 14, and 15. The only original copies of 7, 8, 11, and 14 known to the present writer are those in the Free Presbyterian Library in Glasgow.

1. "History of the Jews; From Moses to the Babylonish Captivity, Viewed in connection with Prophecy," in *A Course of Lectures on the Jews*, by the Ministers of the Established Church (Glasgow, William Collins, 1839), pp. 60-96.

The Church of Scotland in the late 1830s became concerned for its responsibility of taking the gospel to the Jews. In response to sixteen overtures,

the 1838 General Assembly set up a large committee, which included Anderson, to "collect information respecting the Jews, their numbers, condition and character and what means have hitherto been employed by the Christian Church for their spiritual good". The first convener of the committee was Anderson's professor of Divinity, Stevenson MacGill. A course of lectures was delivered in Glasgow during the winter of 1838-39 when twelve lectures were delivered on the history of the Jews and the Church's duty to them. Anderson gave the third lecture; other lectures were given by such men as MacGill, Alexander Somerville, James Gibson, Patrick Fairbairn, and John Duncan. This led to the Mission of Enquiry to the Jews, when Andrew Bonar, Robert Murray M'Cheyne, Alexander Keith, and Alexander Black went to Palestine. For the historical background, see John S. Ross, Time for Favour: Scottish Mission to the Jews, 1838-1852 (Tentmaker Publications, 2011). Anderson's lecture was reprinted as a booklet in the early years of the twentieth century and published by William Wileman, who added to the title of the lecture the words, "and Application to Great Britain".

 "The Work of Christ in connection with the Revival of Religion – His Atonement, Righteousness, and Intercession," in William M. Hetherington (ed.), *Lectures on the Revival of Religion* (Glasgow, 1840), pp. 33-70. This volume was reprinted as *The Revival of Religion* (Banner of Truth Trust, 1984). Anderson's lecture has the same pagination in the reprint as the 1840 edition.

This was a series of lectures by Church of Scotland ministers given just after a period of blessing in Scotland. Besides Anderson, the lecturers include John Bonar of Larbert, Alexander Moody Stuart, Robert Candlish, Alexander Cumming, William Arnot, William Burns of Kilsyth, and Patrick Fairbairn. In a section of Biographical Notes, which is only in the Banner of Truth reprint, the error contained in the *Annals of the Free Church of Scotland* is repeated.

3. Two Sermons preached on Sacramental Occasions (Edinburgh, 1845).

The two sermons are on Isaiah 53:11 and John 17:19. They were preached at a communion season in October 1844. The sermon from John was preached on the Sabbath and the one on Isaiah on the Monday of the communion.

4. Sermon on Psalm 19:12, "The difficulty of attaining to a knowledge of our sins", in *Free Church Pulpit*, Vol. 2 (Perth, 1846), pp. 481-492.

After the Disruption, sermons by Free Church ministers were printed in weekly and monthly publications. Some of these sermons and lectures were subsequently published in three substantial volumes. The publisher that issued the volumes, according to the preface in Volume 2, did so feeling "assured that they have provided for future generations the means of forming no unfair estimate of the qualities which distinguish the pulpit ministrations of those men of God who, for Christ's sake, relinquished the emoluments of the Establishment in 1843".

5. A Warning to Ministers of the Dangers incident to the Ministerial Office (Edinburgh, 1851).

The content of this small volume is a paper that was read before the Free Church Presbytery of Glasgow at its ordinary meeting on 2nd December 1846. The Glasgow Presbytery appointed a committee to prepare a series of subjects for Presbyterial exercises, and to name individuals to prepare and deliver essays on different subjects. This was the topic assigned to Anderson. He points out in the preface that the term "warning" is not used in any offensive sense or out of a feeling of self-sufficiency. He adds, "The writer feels that no one needs the warning more than himself" (p. vi).

6. Notes of a Sermon on the Sabbath preached in the United Presbyterian Church, Wellington Street, Glasgow, 23rd September 1849, at the request of the Working Men's Sabbath Protection Society (Aberdeen, 1851).

The Glasgow Working Men's Sabbath Society had been set up in 1849 by John Henderson (1782-1867), the United Presbyterian Church businessman and philanthropist. He set up this Sabbath Protection Society following the attempt in 1849 by Joseph Locke (1805-1860), the Member of Parliament for Honiton in Devon, to introduce a bill "to secure to the public on Sundays a limited and reasonable use of all railways which convey passengers on other days of the week" (Herapath's Railway Journal, 7th April 1849, cited in C. J. A. Robertson, "Early Scottish Railways and the Observance of the Sabbath", Scottish Historical Review, Vol. 57 (1978), pp. 164-165). Locke was a notable civil engineer who, along with Robert Stephenson and Isambard Kingdom Brunel, was among the pioneers of railway development both in England and Scotland. He had, however, an intense dislike of sabbatarianism. Anderson's lecture was from Leviticus 26:2, "Ye shall keep my Sabbaths, and reverence my sanctuary: I am the Lord". The lecture was given in the Wellington Street United Presbyterian Church and was printed at the request of friends in Aberdeen. This was presumably the circle of friends that were associated with Susan Parker.

7. A Day in John Knox's Free Church, Glasgow: Being Notes of a Lecture and Sermon delivered 12th October 1851 (Glasgow, 1851).

These are addresses given by Anderson at the height of his controversy with ten of his elders.

8. A Second Day in John Knox's Free Church, Glasgow: Being Notes of a Lecture and Sermon delivered 30th November 1851 (Glasgow, 1852).

These are further addresses given by Anderson at the height of his controversy with ten of his elders.

9. A Testimony for Truth: Being a sermon preached in Hope Street Gaelic Church Glasgow on Sabbath Evening 23rd November 1851 (Edinburgh, 1852).

This was a sermon on 2 Thessalonians 2:11-12, "And for this cause God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie; that they all might be damned who believe not the truth, but had pleasure in unrighteousness". It was delivered in Hope Street Free Church in November 1851 and was confused by Neil Cameron with the sermon preached in the Hope Street Church a year earlier on 17th November 1850 in which Anderson criticised Alexander Somerville and William Arnot. For the background to this second Hope Street sermon, see *SRSHJ*, Vol. 4, pp. 193-194.

10. Prayer for Faithful Ministers: A Class Exercise in Knox's Free Church, 19th November 1851 (Glasgow, 1852).

This is an eight-page tract based on 2 Thessalonians 3:1, "Finally, brethren pray for us, that the word of the Lord may have free course, and be glorified, even as it is with you". The tract has 30 questions and answers on the text and a final two-thirds of a page of miscellaneous observations. This exercise took place at the height of Anderson's controversy with ten of his elders.

11. John Knox Church Class Exercise, Wednesday 26th November 1851 (no place of publication or date).

This is another eight-page tract similar to the one above. The exercise took place on the following week and consisted of 34 questions and answers based on Romans 10:1, "Brethren, my heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is, that they might be saved".

12. *I am not a hypocrite* (Edinburgh, undated).

This is an eight-page tract designed mainly to test the genuineness of grace in the lives of those who profess themselves to be converted. It was reprinted by the Blythswood Tract Society as a sermon on Proverbs 30:12. The original has no text at the head of the tract.

13. The Free Church: Her Character and Proceedings in a Series of Letters (Glasgow, 1853).

This is an invaluable book for understanding Anderson's attitude to the Free Church following his resignation in May 1852. It comprises a very informative 20-page introduction by Anderson, and then 84 pages of letters, several being crucial letters of historical importance, along with nine letters to his Glasgow supporters between 21st June and 21st September 1852.

14. A Day in Knox's Tabernacle, Glasgow: Being Notes of Lecture and Sermon delivered on 10th October 1852 (Glasgow, 1853).

The lecture on Philippians 1:27-30 is from a series of lectures that Anderson was delivering on that epistle. The sermon is on Isaiah 49:25. The

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booklet is in a similar format to the two published a year earlier with the title *Days in John Knox Free Church* (Nos. 7 and 8 above).

15. The Alarm! A Magazine for the Times, Eighteen issues from January 1855 to June 1856.

The Alarm! A Magazine for the Times was a monthly magazine commenced by Anderson two and a half years after he left the Free Church. It was printed in Glasgow and ran for eighteen months. The first issue is dated January 1855 and the final issue June 1856, with the pagination running continuously (up to p. 288). Like *The Free Church: Her Character and Proceedings in a Series of Letters*, it is invaluable for understanding Anderson's stance in regard to the Free Church following his resignation. In the pages of this magazine he explains for the first time why he regarded the preaching of John Milne and others as unsatisfactory.

16. Ephraim Chastised and Instructed: A Class Exercise, 2nd July 1856.

This is similar to items 10 and 11 above. The only copy known to the present writer is the reprint in the *Free Presbyterian Magazine*, Vol. 2, pp. 181-185. Anderson seems to have conducted these experimental exercises in the form of questions and answers for many years during the latter part of his ministry. From his diary of 2nd July 1856 it appears this exercise was conducted with his supporters in Aberdeen.

C. Material written by Anderson and published after his death

1. A Voice from the Wilderness: Being a Few Counsels suited to a Season of Affliction in a series of Pastoral letters & Discourses (Glasgow, 1859).

This volume was issued by the office-bearers in John Knox's Tabernacle within a few months of Anderson's death on 10th January 1859. It contains thirty-four pastoral letters written to his congregation, all except the last two being written in the year before he died. The volume also contains seventeen of his last sermons. They were all delivered between October and December 1858. It is clear that on Sabbath mornings he continued systematic preaching through Scripture right up to the end of his life. In these final months of his life he was expounding the first two chapters of the Acts of the Apostles.

2. Lectures and Sermons (Being notes taken by a hearer), Vol. 1 (Glasgow, 1861).

This book contains an exposition of the Epistle to Titus along with an additional thirteen sermons. Although this work has "Volume 1" in the title, there do not appear to have been any further volumes. The thirteenth sermon is a reprint of Anderson's sermon on 2 Thessalonians 2:11-12 (item B9 above).

3. The Transfiguration on the Mount (A. Elliot, Edinburgh, 1868).

This essay was published by Anderson's eldest son, Robert Wodrow Anderson. In the preface, his son says that the essay was clearly intended by his father for publication as it was left in a state of completeness. It was, however, written in an early part of his ministry and "does not define his position and views with regard to ecclesiastical bodies in Scotland with that distinctness which some might desiderate" (p. 6). His son goes on to say that the essay will be appreciated by those who prefer the older Divinity, and that the transfiguration was a heaven-given seal to the Divine mission of the Lord Jesus Christ (pp. 8-9).

4. Days in Kirkfield: Being Discourses on a Revival Occasion in Kirkfield Chapel, Gorbals of Glasgow (London, 1872).

These are sermons preached by Anderson between 24th November 1839 and 5th January 1840 at a time of revival at Kirkfield Chapel in Glasgow. There are seven sermons on Zechariah 12:10 and six lectures on John 17:3. See *SRSHJ*, Vol. 4, pp. 151-154, for the historical background.

5. Soul Counsel: Being letters by the late Rev. Jonathan Ranken Anderson (Glasgow, 1894).

This book is comprised of twenty-seven letters to a young lady written between 18th February 1846 and 31st March 1848. Letters 11 and 12 are important with respect to Anderson's life as they detail the "triumphant death" of his first wife Martha Freer. In addition there are two letters to a lady in distress of soul written on 16th July and 8th August 1845, and six letters to a young man on his deathbed written between 30th May to 27th July 1855,³ and a sermon on Matthew 18:5.

6. *Wisdom's Request, A sermon to the young* (Fifth Edition, Glasgow, 1897).

The sermon is from Proverbs 23:26, "My son, give me thine heart". The booklet is reviewed in the *Free Presbyterian Magazine*, Vol. 2, p. 200. (This was probably a *John Knox Tract* of which no copy has been located.)

7. The Profitable Labour (Glasgow, 1897).

This booklet is reviewed in the *Free Presbyterian Magazine*, Vol. 2, p. 240. (This was probably another *John Knox Tract* of which no copy has been located.)

8. The Outcasts Gathered: Why stand ye here all the day idle?

Bibliographical information on both COPAC and Google Books states that this is *John Knox Tract 62*. (No copy of this tract has been located.)

9. Free Grace Sermons (Glasgow, 1927).⁴

This book contains fifteen sermons by Anderson. It was edited by H. B. Pitt and distributed by Anderson's grandson, Robert Wodrow Anderson. See review in the *Free Presbyterian Magazine*, Vol. 32, p. 318.

10. Life and Sermons of the Late Rev. J. R. Anderson, Vol. 1, Edited by H. B. Pitt (Glasgow, 1934).

This volume has a biographical sketch of Anderson by the editor and eleven sermons, the first of which is the fifth of the Zechariah 12:10 sermons in *Days in Kirkfield* (No. 4 above).

11. Life and Sermons of the Late Rev. J. R. Anderson, Vol. 2, Edited by H. B. Pitt (Glasgow, 1937).

This volume has an enlarged biographical sketch by the editor, along with excerpts from Anderson's Diary on his two visits to Caithness, a short account of Peter MacBride, and seven sermons, two of which are sermons 1 and 2 of the Zechariah 12:10 sermons in *Days in Kirkfield* (No. 4 above).

12. Free Grace Tracts 1-4 (H. B. Pitt, Trowbridge, 1940).

This 32-page booklet is a reprint of *John Knox Tracts* 1-4. See the extended review by Rev. William Maclean in the *Free Presbyterian Magazine*, Vol. 45, pp. 191-193.

13. "Vital Godliness", printed in *Beauty for Ashes, A brochure in Memory of the late Miss Barbara and Miss Isabella Morton* (Glasgow, 1945). This booklet was reprinted by Inverbooks, Inverness, 2003.

This booklet contains biographical accounts of two ladies who were members in St. Jude's Free Presbyterian Church in Glasgow. As young women, along with their parents they attended Anderson's old congregation in Glasgow. Appended to the booklet is an eight-page essay by Anderson on "Vital Godliness".

14. The Spirit of Grace and Supplications (Trowbridge, 1946).

This is a reprint of the seven sermons on Zechariah 12:10, published originally in *Days in Kirkfield* (No. 4 above).

15. Sermons for the Times (Dumbarton, c. 1949).⁵

This small volume consists of three sermons on the following texts: 2 Thessalonians 2:11-12, Isaiah 53:10 and John 6:37. The sermon on 2 Thessalonians 2:11-12 is a reprint of *A Testimony for the Truth* (item B9 above).

This is a reprint of the third of the Zechariah 12:10 sermons in *Days in Kirkfield* (No. 4 above).

This consists of eight sermons from a book of manuscript sermon notes by one of Anderson's hearers in the possession of Dr. Hyde.

 Sermon on Isaiah 27:11 printed in Scottish Reformation Society Historical Journal, Vol. 4 (2014), pp. 247-263.

This was the sermon preached at Hope Street Free Church on 17th November 1850 in which Anderson criticised Alexander Somerville and William Arnot. The sermon led to Anderson being censured by a committee of the Glasgow Presbytery. It was printed in *SRSHJ*, Vol. 4, for the first time from a volume of manuscript sermon notes of Anderson's preaching in the possession of the author of this paper.

D. John Knox Tracts

These are sermons of Anderson's printed at first in the form of an eightpage tract. The first tract was published in January 1851 with the title "The Well of Living Water". The sermon is from John 4:14, "The water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of living water springing up into everlasting life". The tract itself is undated. The date can, however, be ascertained from Anderson's typescript diary; see Anderson's Diary, Vol. 1, 1851, p. 6. These tracts had a significant circulation. In the Free Presbyterian Library there is a volume in which are bound together a number of Anderson writings which were published during his lifetime. The volume includes the first fifteen John Knox Tracts. At the top of the first page of Tract No. 5 are the words "Fourth Thousand", presumably indicating that it was the fourth run of a thousand that had been printed. Many of the tracts were reprinted, and there were at least sixty-two tracts of which we are aware and the series may have continued beyond that. Both COPAC and Google books date Tract 62 as being published in 1900, forty years after Anderson's death. J. K. Popham, reviewing

These are bound typescript volumes copied from the original diaries which now appear to be lost. The names of most of the people are removed and initials inserted in their place. It is doubtful that the original diary would have had names removed. The letters of Anderson, which appear to be in either his or his wife's handwriting, do not omit names. It is very probable that the diaries have been edited. They are, however, the principal source of information on Anderson in the years which they cover. Most daily entries in the diary are divided into four sections, and occasionally five, each one identified by the following letters as abbreviations: P for Personal, F for Family, C for Congregation, Ch for Church, and occasionally St for State.⁷ It is very probable that Anderson kept a diary before 1851 and that these volumes are now lost. See *SRSHJ*, Vol. 5, p. 271, and footnote 159 for a discussion of this matter.

9. Extracts from the Diary of the Rev. J. R. Anderson, 1851-1858.

This is a volume of edited extracts from the eight-volume diary. The book is a sturdy bound hardback in typescript with a leather spine. It is this volume of extracts, not the eight volumes, which Neil Cameron used when he included extracts from Anderson's Diary to the Sketch of his life. Regrettably Cameron repeats the editing which this volume makes of the eight-volume edition. The copy of this volume that the writer has handled belonged latterly to Rev. Donald

Maclean, Glasgow. The volume also contains additional editing by Cameron that is reflected in his published book on Anderson.

10. Jonathan Ranken Anderson, Journal of a Trip to the Highlands, 1827.

This is a small notebook of forty-six pages in Anderson's handwriting describing a journey in the Scottish Highlands in June-July 1827. Anderson was then aged 23.

11. Jonathan Ranken Anderson, Letters to John Bayne from January 1852 to October 1858.

This is an invaluable source of biographical information on Anderson and of his views on ecclesiastical affairs. Bayne was an elder in Dunblane and a confidant of Anderson. It is a hand-written book of 310 pages containing 138 letters.

12. Jonathan Ranken Anderson, Letters to John Bayne from January 1852 to October 1858, 2 vols.

These hand-written volumes of 138 letters may be copies of the single volume or alternatively the originals from which the one-volume edition has been copied. Volume 1 contains letters 1 to 74 and Volume 2 contains letters 75 to 138. The second Volume has a mistake in the numbering of the letters. Letter 76 is numbered 75, so that there are two letters with number 75. The second letter numbered 75 up to letter 137 should therefore be one digit higher in order to make a comparison with the letter in the single volume. The second volume of this set also contains the letters to James Muir, Margaret Hume and Mrs. Ryrie detailed in No. 13 below.

13. J. R. Anderson, *Letters*.

This a very small leather notebook containing six letters to James Muir, dated between 30th May 1855 and 27th July 1855, a letter to Margaret Hume dated 4th September 1854, and three letters to Mrs. Ryrie, Caithness, dated between 14th November 1854 and 12th March 1856.

F. Anderson's manuscript sermons

In the Free Presbyterian Church of Scotland Library there are fortyeight volumes of hand-written transcriptions of Anderson's sermons. In addition to these volumes the writer is aware of a further five volumes in private hands – one is owned by Matthew Hyde and four by the author of this paper. Having spent a considerable amount of time indexing and analysing these transcriptions of Anderson's sermons it seems clear that the forty-eight volumes in the Free Presbyterian Library fall into four distinct groups or series of transcriptions. These are as follows:

The Renton Series⁸

All of these volumes have the name of George Renton in the early pages. Renton eventually became an elder at John Knox's Tabernacle and had been a hearer of Anderson's in the Church of Scotland before the Disruption. Anderson was aware of Renton's activities, as the record in his diary on 2nd December 1853 shows: "I was waited on by two of my deacons about printing in volumes the notes Mr. Renton has of Lectures and Sermons."⁹ In the introductory pages to the volume of Anderson's letters and sermons published by his office-bearers after his death,¹⁰ it states that the sermons were first taken down in shorthand and then transcribed into volumes. The original transcriptions from which the printed volume, *Lectures and Sermons, Vol. 1* (1861) (item C2 above), was produced is the Renton series (see Appendix, Sermon numbers 571, 573-583). Whether Renton himself took the shorthand notes and then transcribed them, or whether he organised someone else to do the work, we do not know.

The Renton volumes are the most important series of sermon transcriptions. They appear to be the originals from which the other three groups of transcripts have been copied. Unlike the other volumes, the Renton series are sequential, detailing Anderson's preaching week by week, forenoon and afternoon, as they were being preached. They also include, in the period when Anderson was a Free Church minister, transcriptions of assisting ministers at communion seasons and other occasions when he was absent. The Renton volumes contain fifty-six sermons, almost all by Free Church ministers, that have never been published.¹¹

The volumes have numbers on them; the last in the series in the Free Presbyterian Library is Volume 40. Regrettably only seventeen of these forty volumes are in the library. The original series may have contained more than forty volumes. The ones held are Vols. 4, 8, 9, 10, 12, 13, 16, 19, 22, 23, 25, 27, 31, 34, 34, 38, and 40. Volume 4 begins at 8th September 1844 and the last dated sermon in the Renton series is 5th December 1858, little more than a month before Anderson died.

The Numbered Series

These would appear to be copies from the Renton series. Like the Renton series, the volumes are numbered, the highest in the Free Presbyterian Library being Volume 26, and again there may have been more than that number. Thirteen of the twenty-six volumes are held. These are Vols. 5, 8, 13a, 13b, 15, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24 and 26. The significance of the term "Numbered" for the series is that each sermon is given a number. In Vol. 5 the first numbered sermon is 47, and the last one in Vol. 26 is 383. The sermons in this series are not sequential. However, the numbering indicates the dates they were read in John Knox's Tabernacle and these dates are sequential. They may have been copied specifically for the purpose of enabling them to be read in public worship due to the handwriting of the Renton volumes being difficult for reading aloud. Almost all these volumes have the name of James Brown on the first page. Because over half of the Renton volumes are now lost or missing, the copies of the sermons in this series in many instances are the only ones extant.

The Third Series

The title of this series is merely to distinguish it from the previous two. The volumes in this series located in the Free Presbyterian Library begin at Vol. 31 and continue to Vol. 58. It is, therefore, possible these volumes are a continuation of the Numbered series. I am not persuaded that is the case for the following reasons:

- 1. The sermons are not numbered.
- 2. The volumes are physically very different and many are written on only one side of the page; this is unlike all the other volumes.
- 3. The handwriting is very different.
- 4. None of the volumes have James Brown's name in them.
- 5. Some of the volumes in this series contain sermons on specific parts of Scripture. Vol. 34 contains Anderson's exposition of Luke 1:23-66 in seven sermons preached at different times during 1854. There is nothing analogous to this in the Numbered series.
- 6. Unlike the Numbered series there are no dates in any of these volumes indicating they had been read to the John Knox's Tabernacle congregation.

Due to volumes being missing in both the Renton and Numbered series there are sermons in this Third series that are not included in either of the other two. Twelve volumes are held from this series. They are Vols. 30, 31, 34, 37, 39, 41, 47, 49, 52, 54, 56, and 58. Volume 31 of this series contains two sermons by Peter MacBride; one is a copy from Vol. 4 of the Renton series. The other is, clearly, from a missing volume of the Renton series and is, therefore, unique to this series.

Miscellaneous Series

These are very different from the other volumes and appear to be copies of Anderson's sermons that individuals have made for their own edification. The four volumes held by the writer of this paper and the one held by Matthew Hyde are also in this category. In addition to these privately held volumes, there are in the Free Presbyterian Library a further six volumes in this category. Only two of the six volumes are numbered; hence the writer has numbered the other four in order to identify them and to locate their contents.

- Vol. 1M This volume has 175 pages and contains six sermons. Two different hands have transcribed the sermons.
- Vol. 2M This volume contains just two sermons and appears to have been written by Anderson's second wife, Ann Alisa Alison. The first sermon is one that Anderson preached on the Sabbath evening of a communion season in St. Paul's Church, Glasgow, when Robert Elder was the minister. The second is a lecture given at John Knox's on 2nd January 1850 on Matthew 15:1-9 and is the only copy of this lecture.
- Vol. 3M This is a larger volume than Vols. 1M and 2M and contains fifteen sermons. A few of these sermons are quite short and are dissimilar to the full transcripts that are contained in most of the other volumes. The ownership of this volume is detailed on one of the early pages. The first owner appears to have been John Auld of the John Knox's Free Presbyterian congregation in Glasgow. As there were two men with the name John Auld in that congregation it cannot be ascertained which one is recorded as the first owner. The older John Auld (1829-1912) attended Anderson's ministry for the

last ten years of his life. The book was given by John Auld to a Mrs. MacGillivray. This could well be Mrs. Morag MacGillivray (her obituary is in the *Free Presbyterian Magazine*, Vol. 84, pp. 51-52). She spent most of her early life in Glasgow. The volume was given by Mrs. MacGillivray to the Rev. William Grant of Halkirk who then gave it with his "best wishes" to the Rev. William Maclean of Ness. After his death the volume then came to the Free Presbyterian Library. The list of all the owners appears to be in Mr. Grant's handwriting.

- Vol. 17M On the inside cover of this volume, in the handwriting of H. B. Pitt, it is stated to be a duplicate of Vol. 17 in the Renton series. There are, however, three sermons at the end of this volume that are not in Vol. 17 in the Renton series. In William Grant's writing, it is said to have been presented to him by Mrs. Anderson, Glasgow.
- Vol. 28M This volume is largely taken up by recording the sermons at the John Knox's Tabernacle April communion season in 1855. In addition to the sermons preached at the communion there is a detailed record of how the tables were fenced and three table addresses all of which are by Anderson. There are six additional sermons besides the communion season addresses. On p. 314 is a most interesting note that reads as follows: "The foregoing manuscripts were copied from Mrs. Parker's copy which was copied from Mrs. J. R. Anderson's notes." The volume was given to William Anderson's notes." The volume was given to William Grant who later gave it to William Maclean.
- Vol. 29M Like Vol. 28M this volume is largely taken up with recording the sermons at a communion season. On this occasion it is the October 1855 communion at John Knox's Tabernacle. The addresses take up 264 pages of the same handwriting as Vol. 28M. There are four additional sermons. Again, in Mr. Grant's writing, the volume was presented to him by Mrs. Anderson, Glasgow. William Grant later gave it to William Maclean.

Volumes held privately

Matthew Hyde obtained a volume from a second-hand bookseller which contained eleven sermons. Three of these were already printed in volumes published by H. B. Pitt. Dr. Hyde has published the remaining eight sermons privately in 2013 in a volume entitled *The Witness of Noah* (see C18 above).

Three of the four volumes held by the present writer are very similar to 28M and 29M and are in the same handwriting, which is very careful and clear. The third volume which is identified as RM3 in the index is similar to 28M and 29M in that it contains Anderson's preaching at an entire communion season at John Knox's Tabernacle in October 1854, the one prior to the communion season recorded in 28M. These volumes, therefore, seem to be part of another set of transcriptions that involved both Anderson's second wife and Susan Parker as copyists.

The fourth volume owned by the author is one that he has only recently obtained and contains just one sermon by Anderson, one by Peter MacBride, and ten sermons by John Love preached at Anderston Chapel in Glasgow between 18th October and 22nd November 1818. The one by Anderson was preached on the Friday evening of a communion season on 23rd October 1846. The volume adds that the sermon was preached shortly after the death of Peter MacBride. This occurred on 2nd October 1846; both Anderson and McBride were part of a circle of Dr. Love's admirers which also included John Duncan and Gavin Parker. The handwriting in this volume (identified as RM4) is the same as that of one of the copyists of Vol. 1M.

It should be noted that – with the exception of the Third series – all these volumes (including those in private hands) contain dates when the sermons were read in John Knox's Tabernacle after Anderson's death. Some were read on several occasions.
