

Foursquare Gospel Triumphs Thousands Turning to Christ. Word Confirmed on the Continent

Thanks be unto God which always causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of His knowledge by us in every place.—II. Cor. ii. 14.

THESE words describe and give the reason for the amazing and victorious progress of the gospel message in the days of Paul. In the face of fierce opposition and cruel misunderstanding, the apostle held forth the Word of Life; the Word of God sent a flame of revival sweeping through the land like a prairie fire: from city to city, from town to town, until the whole civilised world felt its power. Miracles of salvation and healing were the order of the day; and Paul could say, "Thanks be unto God which always causeth us to triumph in Christ . . . in every place."

A revival similar to this is taking place to-day in France and Switzerland. The Foursquare flame that has burned so brightly in the British Isles has leapt across the channel. A mighty work is being done, and God is pouring His divine life and power into the souls and bodies of thousands. The great blessing that has accompanied the preaching of the Foursquare Gospel message in England is being repeated on the Continent! Hallelujah! This time it was my privilege to be one of Principal George Jeffreys' Revival Team for this apostolic tour.

ACROSS THE CONTINENT.

Our first meetings were held in France: and it was here that we began to witness the great triumph of the Foursquare Gospel in other lands. Come with me in imagination to the large theatre at Le Havre, and you will understand. The building is packed when we arrive, from the floor to the highest gallery, and the people are singing our well-known Elim choruses what a sight! and what a triumph for the gospel! All these people were once held in the cruel bonds of superstition and error. To-day they are free, and if we have any doubts, they are banished as we hear these people roar "Hallelujah" in response to some particular truth in the Principal's message which has become precious to them. We rejoiced to hear from some of the pastors here that a superstitious religion which formerly held them is losing its grip on the people of France. They are turning to Christ in hundreds. So great is the revival indeed, that it is impossible to find sufficient pastors and evangelists to shepherd those that are being saved.

We had two more tremendous meetings in the Catholic city of Rouen, where a great work of the Holy Spirit is going on, and, praise God, more than a hundred were again

ADDED TO THE LORD.

It was hard to tear ourselves away from these people, but our tour had been planned and we had to go. God bless the people of France! Let us pray that God will give them the pastors they need, and strengthen those that they have, that they might carry on this wonderful full-orbed gospel work. But I must hurry on, I am supposed to be writing about Zurich and have not got to Switzerland yet.

We sped on via Paris for Switzerland, eagerly looking forward to seeing something of the revival work of which we had heard so much. We were not disappointed. The work of the Holy Spirit is a lasting work and the Foursquare Gospellers of Switzerland have not lost their joy and enthusiasm as quickly as some of their critics predicted. They were waiting for us when we arrived, their faces wreathed in smiles, singing a welcome. A welcome, by the way, which has been just as hearty everywhere we have gone. I could not help remarking to another member of the team "They are simply bursting with pleasure." We started our meetings in this atmosphere at Berne on Saturday afternoon and stayed until Sunday night-a short time! Yes! but a revival time. From the very commencement

and over 400 decided for Christ. There were healings too, and I noticed one sister who had been prayed for by the Principal in the morning, and who had been unable to walk, on her feet in the evening meeting, waving her hymn sheet with the rest and praising God. So it has been all the time, and in every place. God is confirming His Word with signs following.

At Bienne, where a great revival took place last year, there was great power in every meeting and nearly three hundred souls found Christ. We then moved on to Baden—a beautiful spa to which people come from all over the world to "take the waters" which are said to contain medicinal properties. We held three meetings here and 214 "took the waters"; but not the horrible-tasting liquid that bubbles up from springs all over the town, but living water supplied by a living Christ.

Now I must tell you of Zurich—the largest city in Switzerland, and very beautiful—set in the most perfect surroundings, with the Alps

TOWERING IN THE BACKGROUND

and looking down upon the huge lake, dancing and glittering in the sun and inviting us to swim or sail. Surely everyone here is happy and satisfied; they will hardly be attracted to religious services. If we think this we discover our mistake when we visit the Ton Halle. It is filled with people whose hearts are hungry for something better and more lasting than anything they can find in their beautiful city. They want to meet with God and to feed upon His Word. It is an amazing sight, about 2,000 people in the grip of real revival. We cannot understand the language they use as they sing, but we read in many of their faces the joy of Christ. The atmosphere is absolutely heavenly, and the Word of God so faithfully preached by our beloved Principal is breaking down barriers all over the building, and making a way for Christ to be enthroned in many hearts. At the first meeting 139 crowned Him as Lord of their lives, and by the time the four meetings were ended nearly 700 were saved.

It is quite certain that the whole of Zurich would have been

if we had stayed longer, but we had to move on, and pray that God will so mightily use those who have decided for Him, that the whole city may even yet be stirred. It is impossible to measure the results that will follow

The fire is spreading however, and there are very few places in this land that have not been affected. The apostle thanked God for enabling him to triumph always in Christ in every place. We thank Him too, for this tour so far has been a "tour of triumphs."

Triumph over superstition and vice. Wicked superstitious systems are giving way before the power of the Foursquare Gospel.

Triumph over fanaticism. Many who had ceased to associate themselves with this truth because of the unwise behaviour of certain individuals, have been won back by the Principal's intelligent presentation of the message.

Triumph over language difficulty. Although all the messages have to pass through an interpreter before they reach the people, God has wonderfully undertaken and we have not felt like "foreigners." We have tried to converse with the people and although we have used the wrong words often, and mixed

together, they seem to understand, and if we do get stuck we just say "Hallelujah!" They always understand that.

Triumph over fatigue. We have travelled thousands of miles, and have had dozens of meetings, late nights and early rising, packing and unpacking our bags dozens of times, yet the Lord has wonderfully helped us. The Principal too, has been sustained in a marvellous way and enabled to go through the official programme, as well as an unofficial one, without fail. Lastly,

Triumph over sin. Over 2,500 have found the Lord as Saviour and we have still three weeks to go before the tour is ended. The chains of sin are breaking 'neath the power of redeeming grace.

This glorious Foursquare Gospel is penetrating to every part of Switzerland and bringing revival blessing everywhere it goes. We can heartily endorse the words of Paul and say "Thanks be unto God which always causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of His knowledge by us in every place."

sons were venturing into unknown lands, a small band from Europe found their way to neglected Ethiopia. Since then, through many vicissitudes, a witness to the gospel has been constantly maintained, though at times the light has been flickering. Since the accession of the present ruler, who became regent in 1916, King in 1928, and Emperor in 1930, there has been a wide open door to missionaries. Ten different agencies, large and small, have availed themselves of the opporutnity. Emperor Haile Selassie is a devout Christian considering all circumstances. He has personally provided for an edition of the Bible in Amharic, so that his people might have the Word of God.

From Here, There, and Everywhere

BOTH IN "ACTS."

Italy and Ethiopia are side by side on front page news columns to-day. Italy and Ethiopia are also side by side in the Word of God. In Acts, chapter viii., we read of the conversion of the Ethiopian eunuch the Chancellor of the Exchequer of his day. In Acts, chapter x., we read of the conversion of Cornelius, an Italian.

TWO ILLUMINATING ARTICLES.

It has been our privilege to read two illuminating articles on Ethiopia—one in *The Moody Monthly* and one in *The Defender*. They are so timely and informative that we do not hesitate to fill this page with extracts, although we have before us much other matter "From Here, There, and Everywhere."

A GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

Ethiopia or Abyssinia is the only remaining independent Kingdom of Africa, shut off entirely from the sea by the colonial territories appropriated by various European powers. It occupies an area of 350,000 square miles, or a little more than France and Italy combined. While the borders are low, the interior plateau averages some 7,000 feet in elevation, with many mountains reaching to 12,000 and 15,000 feet. Timber and minerals abound, though little developed or utilised, while the vast majority of the population follow the pursuits of agriculture and herding. The population numbers approximately ten million. An astonishing fact is that in the extreme northern highlands there lives a community of some 50,000 Jews, having come over in the dim past and long since ceased to speak the Hebrew language. They are called Falashas. All authorities agree that, though they are black, they are nevertheless Hebrews. Physiognomies, habits of life, and detailed continuance of the Levitical ceremonies confirm their identity.

CONNECTION WITH SOLOMON.

From the archives of Ethiopia it has been unquestionably established that King Haile Selassie (pronounced Highly Selossy) is a direct descendant of King Solomon and the Queen of Sheba. It is of prophetic interest to note that a descendant of Solomon should be on the throne at this particular time when prophecy is being fulfilled so rapidly.

WHY "KING OF KINGS "?

The present King, Haile Selassie, bears the official title of "King of Kings" and is also called "The Conquering Lion of Judah." Some have had the impression that he seeks to deify himself by appropriating these titles, but this is not the case.

Ethiopia was formerly divided into provinces with many kings. In the re-organisation of the Government, these provinces were united into one Kingdom, with one King over the kings, and he, therefore, became the "King of Kings" of the Kingdom of Ethiopia."

MUSSOLINI AFTER GOLD.

The reason Mussolini is determined to go into Ethiopia is not that he may settle any boundary dispute or appease Italian humiliation to which the country was subjected in 1896 at the hands of the Ethiopian soldiers. When the real reason is known it will be revealed that Mussolini is after gold.

He is intoxicated with a desire to rule the human family and to see the present Roman Empire surpass the former glories of Rome. But he needs gold. Gold has always been a synonym of power and will continue to be. The bulk of the gold of Italy is to-day in England as security for money borrowed during the World War.

The greatest sources of gold in the world are to be found in Ethiopia.

GOLDEN ETHIOPIA.

Let us remember when Solomon was building his temple and needed an enormous supply of fine gold, the Tyrian sailors brought it from Ophir. Solomon's agents were sent to Ophir, and on one single occasion returned with 120 talents.

There was a time in Ethiopia when even the prisoners were bound with chains of gold, Recently Haile Selassie began to reopen the gold mines of Ophir. This is evidently viewed with envy by Mussolini, and if these mines could be ravaged, he knows it would then be possible for him to make a bid, for world supremacy.

WILL AFRICA (figuratively) EXPLODE?

Who can even guess what the horrible outcome will be of Mussolini striking Ethiopia? The best commentators believe that both Africa and Europe may explode when the fuse ignites.

It is significant to realise that one man is strong enough, in world affairs, to produce such an explosion. What is this strange power that Mussolini possesses? Where does it originate? From whence came the criminal thought that bored its way into his brain, inspiring him to commit this unspeakable outrage? Is Mussolini Satan's man of destiny, associated so often with the prophecies of the age-end?

A REMARKABLE SUGGESTION.

The Word says that there shall be great pain in Ethiopia (Exek. xxx, 4), when the slain shall fall in Egypt. We venture to make this interpretation of prophecy that the outcome of the Ethiopian-Italian war will have much to do with the selection of the Antichrist who will rule during the "Tribulation." Out of the coming turmoil, Satan's man, the "Man of Sin" will step forth as the world's counterfeit Christ.

ETHIOPIA STRETCHING OUT HER HANDS (Psalm Ixviit, 31).

Though efforts have been made to bring them the good news for over a century only within recent years has Ethiopia appeared prominently on the missionary map. When the Careys, the Morrisons and the Jud-

A S an introduction to our missionary report we quote words spoken by the famous prince of preachers—C. H. Spurgeon: "The history of Christianity is a story of the supernatural. It is supernatural all through. It is a series of miracles. Hoary systems of idolatry will not crumble before eloquence; long established systems of sin will not disappear before reasoning. It is the Holy Ghost and the power of Jesus Himself that must accomplish this deed. The whole work is supernatural."

In again submitting these reports from the pens and hearts of our representatives on the distant fields, there can be seen in each something at work outside the **realm** of the human—the power of the supernatural. Our missionaries have had to fling themselves clean over upon God, washing their hands of the consequences. They have had so to speak, the sentence of death in themselves, that they might be brought to that unspeakable place of power, where they no longer trust in themselves, but in God, and there they are safe. There are no defects in Him. The word pictures that follow carry us to scenes of difficulty and test, but of triumph, too, in those far-away lands where the person of Jesus has been exalted and where, as ever before, when He has been lifted up hearts and lives have been drawn unto Him. The work has been supernatural, and idolatry and sin have been swept away by the flood-tides of Holy Ghost power.

Across the rolling billows between us and far-off Japan there comes a clear clarion cry from Miss Hoskins for that nation and its needs at this time. She writes :---

"The months that have passed have been full of difficulty for Japan. One disaster has followed another and distress has been widespread, until one hardly knows of any district that has not in some way or other been affected. Following a season of drought, the rainy season has brought disastrous floods to many parts of the country, causing the loss of many lives and much suffering besides tremendous damage done. Such floods have not been known for thirty-nine years -yet surely this is none other than God's solemn warning to this nation to repent and turn to Him who **alone** is their refuge and strength. As in years that have passed God has spoken to this nation through terrible catastrophes and widespread sorrow and suffering, so it seems He has spoken once more during the past week, and it has filled many with terror and they wonder what will happen next, and yet so many seem to have hardened their hearts against the preaching of His holy Word. One wonders just how long God will be patient and hold open the door of grace for them. Let us pray for a widespread revival to come.

In spite of the heavy rains, we were encouraged to see quite a good number at the meetings on Sunday, which shows that the Holy Spirit is really working in their hearts and they have a desire to hear His Word and follow on in the light they have already received. Please pray with us that they may become bold witnesses for Christ in their homes and everywhere.

But for the mighty grace of God, I feel sometimes I can hardly bear to listen to the sad heart-breaking stories of some of these dear people among whom I am working, and yet my joy is great to be able to lead them to Him to find peace and real love. Tears often flow fast and free as we tell them of the sympathising Saviour who said ' Come unto Me.'

Please pray for one of the young mothers who comes to the meetings. She was saved soon after I came here but she is suffering deeply these days. It is so lovely to see how God is graciously upholding her through it all. Pray for her husband to be born of the Spirit soon; also pray for the Christians and young converts and for many more to come into the fold.

For still the Saviour calls them, and looks across the wold, And still He holds wide open, the door into His fold.

Mrs. Thomas writes us a very interesting account of how she redeems the time while guarding their little gospel car while her husband is preaching and giving out Gospels, etc., in the villages :—

" My work in these villages is usually to look after the car as there are no garages and the children are so badly behaved that we dare not leave the car unattended, but the people always come around to stare at us so I have opportunities to speak to them about the only One who is able to save them.

In this village-just like what happens in the others -as soon as Mr. Thomas and his helper have gone, the people from these cottages come around, men, women and children and sit under the tree and begin to talk about Margaret Jewyl and say how fair she When I told them that she was just a little more is. than four years, they were surprised, and said that she was a big girl for her age. When they learned that she could speak Spanish just as well as they could, they were charmed. All this gave me an opening to speak to them about the gospel, and one young man present began to make rude remarks and laugh. I learned from what he was saying that he was a communist. I spoke to him, explaining some things, then he began to listen and for more than five hours I was talking to those people almost all the time. Some of the people went away and returned after awhile; new ones came and stopped to listen-we were on the side of the main road. Among those who stayed almost to the end was this young communist. Another man was especially interested and stayed the whole time. One woman came up riding a donkey and stood listening for a long time. After a while one of the women who were listening went to her house and brought out a dish of fruit and gave it to us. I must say we have never had such kindness shown us in any other village that we have been to and never before has anyone brought out chairs for us to sit on, or offered us fruit.

Towards the end of my stay with these people, a woman brought out a chair and sat beside me and

began asking questions. She asked if I believed in the Mass. I said we did not call it Mass but Holy Communion. This woman was a fanatical Roman Catholic and loved her Church. I answered her very lovingly. She then asked if I believed that the priest performed a miracle when he consecrated the wafer and transformed it into the very body and blood of our Lord Jesus. I replied that I could not believe that, because the Bible taught us differently and that we take the bread and wine in memory of His death. She then said that our Lord, when He instituted the Mass, said : ' This is My body.' I then tried to show her that the disciples did not actually eat our Lord, and that He was with them for some time after the Supper, and later died on the Cross for us. She did not seem to be able to understand it and went away sad. Earlier in the day she had bought a copy of the Gospel according to Luke and I had told her to read it. Pray for this dear woman that the light of the gospel may shine into her heart and that instead of sadness she might have the joy of His salvation.

All this time I was sitting comfortably in a chair under the walnut tree while Mr. Thomas and his helper were going from door to door in the hot sun talking to the people and leaving with them some portion of the Word of God. They met all kinds of people; some were rude to them, others quite indifferent, while a few showed interest. Apart from distributing portions of the Word of God and tracts, we sold eighty-three Gospels and four New Testaments.

Oh, how we long to see a real revival in Spain, something like what we saw when we were in the Elim Bible College. The whole of East London was ablaze with revival. What glorious times we had in those meetings conducted by Principal Jeffreys. Barking, East Ham, Canning Town, Ilford, not to mention the wonderful things God did in Surrey Tabernacle. But praise God, He is just the same to-day. One morning last week while I was having my quiet time alone with the Lord, He brought afresh to my mind the words of Luke i. 37: ' For with God nothing shall be impossible.'" (to be continued).

An Appreciation of Grace Brown

NLY one who has worked hand-in-glove with a great missionary can know the nobility of such a life. The selflessness, the unremitting energy, the composure through every varying phase of sorrow, trial, and triumph, radiate a life that is drawn from the Master whom they serve. When a missionary is great, it is solely because he or she is a true ambassador of the King of kings. Such was Grace Brown, pioneer and leader of the little Maranatha Mission, Giridih, Bihar, India.

Grace Brown was a very clever woman, and in her early life her academic abilities were known in America and England. Returning to the land of her birth, for many years she ably fulfilled the Principalship of a girls' school for Anglo-Indians in the Hills of India. Then—in the first years of this Latter Rain outpouring, the Holy Ghost fell upon this godly, reserved educationalist, and she was led of the Spirit into vernacular evangelistic work. With uttermost abandonment to her Master, with wide sympathetic altruism, with entire self-effacement and self-sacrifice, did she continually and unceasingly give herself to the Mission which indigenously grew up around her.

In 1912 she opened up a forceful evangelistic propaganda on the Amta-Howrah line. She lived in the quaintest thatched bungalow, with the Indian women and palm trees around here; and only a few steps across the sward took them into the little train crowded with Bengalis, and immediately their gospel propaganda began. So much was their work respected, that

until a few years ago they received free passes from that railway company.

In 1919 the headquarters of the little Mission was planted in Giridih, and it has since been the site of a steady stream of converts from Hinduism mostly; and the tiny half-native Mission house has always been the hub of activity. Bengali chatter, Hindi hymns, English prayers have been but the outer shell of growing miracles underneath. At Grace Brown's knee souls have come out of the fetters of heathenism into the new birth; Jesus has transformed lives from devilry and gross sensuality unto the worship and usefulness of Christian discipleship, broken bodies have been healed, and believers have been baptised with the Holy Ghost; just a one-by-one stream, and mostly folk of brown skins. Larger missions, and more famous missionaries have sent their Bible women to her to be trained, and the original course she put them through was as practical and to the point as all her methods, albeit her work was largely a hidden one, and the little Mission house-choked full of Indians and animalsseemed like a home of love in the centre of a wide area of fruitful evangelism.

Grace Brown, several times in her active life, has known the valley of the shadow, she has been there more than once, she has had times of bliss with her Lord there while those in health about her only saw the symptoms of death. Jesus was always her own Physician, and gradually, or suddenly, He would raise her up again for His own work. But this time He has received her over into His Home.

"For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom. viii. 38, 39).

SAD thrill passed through our hearts on the 3rd October. Involuntarily we braced ourselves to meet a tragic emergency. The papers variously expressed it-but the same fact was in the thought of all. One placard simply said, "War." Another said, "War Starts." With some of us the year 1914 suddenly reappeared in 1935. We can remember war starting then. We can remember the terrible years that followed. And now we are facing war again. We are facing twenty-one years later what we faced in 1914, but the possibilities are much worse. War then was terrible. War now is indescribable. I cannot bring myself to say that war is hell on earth as some would. For from every battlefield men can lift up their hearts to God and find Him through Jesus Christ. But I do say that modern warfare is the closest approach to hell imaginable. The horrors of war are worse than appalling-they are maddening.

War starts! When will it end! We catch our breath as we ask it. When will it end? Yes, when and where will it end? Will it touch our shores? Will it claim the flower of our manhood?

War starts! Where will the world be next year? Mussolini speaks. " A solemn hour is approaching in the history of our country . . . the wheel of destiny moves towards a goal-the rhythm has become faster and cannot now be stopped." Yes,

moves toward a goal. Will that goal be the revelation of Antichrist? Will it be the gathering of all nations against Jerusalem to battle? Will it be the Great Tribulation? Will it close with Armageddon and the setting up of Christ's earthly kingdom?

Who knows? Who knows? Prophetic students will be busy-rightly so. The Church of Jesus Christ needs instruction. Yet we must be carefulcareful not to jump to conclusions, careful not to be rash. Maybe we are in the closing moments of this dispensation. If so then how near is the rapture of the Church? Very near-are we ready? Are we ready?

But to every minister-every Church of Jesus Christ, there has come a new responsibility. Now is the time for every minister to teach the Word of God on this awful subject of war. Now is the time for the Church of Jesus Christ to respond to that teaching. Now is the time for the people of God to prove that they stand foursquare on the Word of God. War drives some from God; it draws others to Him. War causes some to say they have no time for the Bible. War causes others of us to seek it more diligently. What says the Scripture?



Well, what do the Scriptures say? What light will they throw upon

THE PRESENT CRISIS?

What saith the Scriptures? In a short message we cannot tell all that the Scriptures say. We cannot go into detailed problems and qualifications. We must deal with the question here a little and there a little. God will use different ones to set forth His message.

But now let me pause and say-In my own heart I suddenly became aware of facing up to a crisis. In the face of war a minister dare not be silent. He must give a lead to his people. He must search and teach the Scriptures. But what should I teach? Then I found myself reading the 17th chapter of John and suddenly the words of the 14th verse seemed to be heavily printed. They seemed to be placed there in reinforced capitals. ' Ye are not of the world, even as I am not of the world."

"Ye are not of the world"! Yet is it not absurd so to speak? I feel I am of the world-very much of it. I eat the world's food, I pay the world's taxes, I contact with the world's people. What can the Saviour's words mean? Then another verse springs up into my memory. I find it in the very next chapter.

" My kingdom is not of this world : If My kingdom were of this world, then would My servants fight '' (John xviii. 36).

In the world! Yes; but not of it. Let us list a few scriptures :

- (a) "I pray not that Thou shouldest take them out of the world " (John xvii. 15).
- (b) "Ye are the light of the world " (Matt. v. 14).
- (c) "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel " (Mark xvi. 15).
- (d) "I have sent them into the world" (John xvii, 18).
- (e) "We are made as the filth of the world" I. Cor. iv. 13).
- (f) "Ye shine as lights in the world" (Phil. ii. 15).

We are left in the world, we are to shine in the world, we are to go into the world—and yet, and yet—we are not of the world.

Another scripture puts the matter so clearly. It uses a worldly figure but it gives a vivid heavenly truth:

"Though we walk in the flesh, we do not war after the flesh. The weapons of our warfare are not carnal" (II. Cor. x. 3, 4).

Yet, again, another scripture speaks. It speaks of the saints of old, but its teaching also refers to the saints of to-day.

"These all died in faith . . . and confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth" (Heb. xi. 13).

So that as far as this earth goes we are *pilgrims* and *strangers*. The same thought is contained in the words in II. Corinthians v. 20: "Now then we are ambassadors for Christ." Add to this the thought that "our citizenship is in heaven" (Phil. iii. 20), then how apt are the words of another who says: "An ambassador does not belong to the country to which he has been sent, and he ever remembers that. However friendly he may be with the nation to whom he is sent, he never forgets that his whole loyalty and full service must be given to his own King, and he must not for an instant allow himself any association, however innocent it may appear, which may in any measure curtail his

FREEDOM OF ACTION

in the interests of his own country.

Picking up an old pamphlet from my files of twenty years ago I find reference to Ephesians vi. We are reminded in that chapter that "Our wrestling is not against blood and flesh, but against principalities, against authorities, against the world rulers of the darkness of this age, against wicked spirits in the heavenlies." We are exhorted to put on "the whole armour of God." The writer of the pamphet aptly remarks : " 'The whole armour of God ' surely does not include bombs, shells, bayonets and poison gas."

So then we are to remember that "We are not

of the world, even as Christ is not of the world." We are to remember that if Christ's kingdom were of this world then would His servants fight. But now is His kingdom not of this world. Some day, praise God, it will be even of this world. Revelation xi. 15 distinctly says concerning the future,

"The kingdoms of this world are become the kingdoms of our Lord, and of His Christ; and He shall reign for ever and ever."

The fact that, in the future, the kingdoms of the world shall become the kingdoms of Christ is another proof that at the present time they are not His kingdoms. At the present time our King is rejected, and we who belong to

HIS HEAVENLY KINGDOM

are rejected with Him. We are not of this world in the sense that we must blindly yield to its control and rulership. As an ambassador to a far country partakes of the hospitality of that country so do we. We gladly and gratefully acknowledge all that the world gives us in the way of food, and protection, and in turn we are glad to do all we possibly can for the world. We help to our utmost in ways that are consistent with that of an ambassador, but when it comes to blindly selling our freedom and consenting to kill in any way and at any time that others command, then we take our stand upon the command of our supreme King and we remember that we are not of this world even as He is not of this world. We will use our spiritual weapons. We will pray and intercede at the throne of God. We will perform deeds of mercy. We will bind up the wounds of the wounded. We will care for the dying. We will do all the good in all the ways we can as long as we are allowed to obey our Master in His binding command : "Put up thy sword into his place: for all they that take the sword shall perish with the sword " (Matt. xxvi. 52).

On such subjects as this, we say again,

THERE ARE MANY DIFFICULTIES

that meet the enquirer. But we believe they are all answered in the Word of God, but in one short article we cannot hope to deal with all these. All we can do is to give a general *outline* of Scripture and fill in the *inlines* later.

Meanwhile we come back to the convincing statement of our beloved Lord. No one was being more ifl-treated at the time. Naturally the complete injustice to which He was being treated would make our blood boil—yet in the midst of it all he calmly said, "My kingdom is not of this world: if My kingdom were of this world, then would My servants fight."

The Crimson Path to Power

"Without . . . blood."-Hebrews ix. 22.

O Wondrous Galilean Thy sceptre is a cross; Thy path to boundless pow'r, The way of pain and loss. And souls who seek to reign Their cross must carry, too, No bloodless crown is worn By those who have gone through.

THE pathway of blood was the Master's way to universal dominion. His is the eternal empire of the thorn-crowned brow and the open side. Forth from that spear-pierced body flowed a stream of conquering virtue reaching unto earth's remotest bounds, a flood of cleansing, healing power which invaded the realms of darkness and despair, bringing life and light and liberty in its course.

It is the pierced hand of Golgotha that is alone worthy to wield the sceptre of world rulership. He who was willing to tread the winepress is now able to occupy the throne. He whose life was bathed in the poverty of Bethlehem and Nazareth shall yet receive the homage of all creation.

And so all who would company with Him must be prepared to learn the royal lesson that "without ... blood" there can be no real kinship or kingship in God. If I would share the universal influence of His passion then I must know the fellowship of His wounds. I may sing of His suffering and still remain unacquainted with His Cross. I may proclaim the virtue of His redemptive sacrifice and yet fail to enter into the partnership of His pain. In glowing terms I may portray that act of self-emptying love and never know the loss of a single tear or drink one drop of the bitterness of that cup. I may admire Calvary's baptism of blood and still pursue my life of self indulgence.

I drain thy blood-red depths O cup of crucifixion, And by that act of faith, I prove Love's resurrection.

Forgive me, blessed Lord, inasmuch as I have thought to tread the bloodless way, and sought to escape the Cross in actual experience. Teach me, Master Divine, that Thy life in me may only come to its sublimest fruition as it passes down into death. Show me that it is as I am immersed in Thy agony that I shall realise the irresistible energy of Thy victory rising up within me. Grant me to understand that I am most powerful when I share Thy poverty; that the virtue of my ministry is greatest when I am clad in the garments of Thy humiliation; that my influence is most efficacious when I stand with Thee " without the camp."

At the entrance to the path of radiant discipleship stands a cross which constitutes a challenge to the would-be knight of God. It prohibits all spirit of compromise. He that would go forth to achieve exploits for God must keep to the highway of the Cross.

Opening Services of New Elim Tabernacle, Lurgan


FOR many years the members of the Lurgan assembly had looked forward to the time when a substantial building should be erected in the town for the proclamation of the Foursquare Gospel; recently their hopes were realised and a lovely new Tabernacle was opened by Mr. John Leech, M.A., K.C.




The New Elim Tabernacle, Lurgan

NEW ELIM TABERNACLE

Opened by Mr. John Leech, M.A., K.C.

The opening service held on Saturday afternoon in connection with the dedication of the new Elim Tabernacle, Windsor Avenue, was of a most enthusiastic character. Whilst it marked the beginning of a new era of prosperity in this branch of the Christian Church, it also marked the end of a successful and ambitious building programme. Not many years ago the Elimites were unknown in Lurgan, and as Mrs. Stoneham (London), pointed out, they began in a small tent on the Avenue Road. Shortly alterwards they moved into a back room in Carnegie Street, and later into the old Red Triangle Hut in Windsor Avenue. The membership continued to increase, and it was decided to build a Tabernacle sufficient for the needs of Lurgan and district. The building is 72 feet long by 31 feet wide and is capable of comfortably seating four hundred people, but on Saturday afternoon there were many more in attendance, and the overflow was accommodated in the adjoining hut. They were able to take part in the opening ceremony through the kindness of Mr. T. L. Adamson, Union Street, who installed a broadcasting service.

On Saturday morning Mr. John Leech arrived, and well and truly laid the marble stone bearing the following inscription: "This stone was laid by Mr. John Leech, K.C., 14th September, 1935 "-" The Word of God Abideth for Ever "- and the first act of the opening ceremony, which commenced at 3.30 p.m., was its unveiling by Mr. Leech, a ceremony witnessed by about four hundred persons.

Pastor T. E. Francis presided, and the proceedings commenced with the singing of "Praise God from Whom all Blessings Flow." Pastor Francis then introduced Mr. John Leech and Mrs. Stoneham to the congregation. In the first place he said he wished to thank all who had so kindly helped in the building scheme.

Continuing, he said they had been preparing for that afternoon's ceremony for many months, and it was wonderful to think of how the Lord had blessed them in their efforts.

Mrs. Stoneham then told of a meeting held in 3, University Avenue, Belfast some years ago when Mr. Henderson asked for volunteers to go to Lurgan. When they first came to Lurgan they met with a good deal of opposition. They found that the people of Lurgan were very hard to move at first, but in a short time they made many friends amongst the warm-hearted people of the town. The first members came to Lurgan having nothing, but she was glad to say that they very soon made many friends and they lacked for nothing.

Mr. Leech then led in the prayer of dedication. They thanked

God for having given them that hall so suitable for the services that were to be held in it. They dedicated the Church to His Praise, to His Glory and to His Service; that it may be a place from that time forth from which the full Foursquare Gospel should be preached-Jesus the Saviour, Jesus the Baptiser and Healer, and also the Coming King.

Proceeding, he said he would like to formally declare the Church open from that day, for the service of God, for the preaching of the Foursquare Gospel of the grand old Bible.

The service was concluded by the fervent singing of the hymn: "Guide me, O Thou Great Jehovah," and the Benediction.




And why not Emotionalism in Religion?

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
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
