THERE'S been a lot of looking up lately. Folks who normally ignore the star-studded heavens have shown an unusual interest in the vast expanse above

them. Not that they are to be blamed for this. The appearance of a comet is a rare occurrence.

Escaping from the diverting glare of the town lights my son and I made for a hilltop in the country. I focused the binoculars on the comet, and there was the gleaming head, and behind it, as the ever-widening wake of a ship, was the tail which some authorities tell us is a million miles long.

Now I have a quarrel with this comet. And treating it as a personality I say, "Who does he think he is?" Suddenly he invades our hemisphere, remains with us a few nights, writes his name in our history books, and is gone. "Here I am," he says, and with vulgar ostentation flings himself across our sky. As though there were no lights up there before he came! He doesn't ask for a firework display to herald his coming: he brings his own pyrotechnics. Those who are fortunate enough to see him through powerful telescopes can pick out the glowing details of his luminous tail. They can see him careering through space scattering his incandescence as he demands the attention of one and all. And so we gaze at him-this nine-days' wonder-this parading personality who is here today and gone tomorrow.

And all around the stars look on. No place for them in the history books. The comet has stolen the thunder, the space, the news column. But the stars aren't worried. They smile knowingly as this pompous manifestation passes by. In their shrinking timidity they can afford to wait until this vaunting pageantry is over. For they have a place this proud publicity seeker can never aspire to. They are plotted on the charts carried by every mariner, and for centuries have faithfully guided men across the dark watery wastes. They have no flashing tail, but in their quiet unassuming way they move with unchanging regularity across our sky. This comet—

this flash in the pan—who for a brief moment has hit the headlines—cannot compare with these staunch servants of society. In one mad rush he has gone, offering no service, knowing no sense of responsibility; soon he'll be a memory.

No doubt the seafaring men in common with us all have taken observations of this temporary visitor, and none more certain than they of his uselessness. They have something else to which they can pin their faith. Their valuable charts offer a promise of unerring guidance. Those charted stars, unobtrusive in comparison with this comet's bid for fame, have a utility he cannot aspire to. Across the mysteries of space they extend their helping hand.

I shail not attempt to explain the parable. I'll end with a question: "Are you a comet—or a star?"

His little sister felt very good; she could say her prayers all right. In smug piety, tinged with self-righteousness she said them perfectly. When she came to "God bless grandfather," a muffled voice from under the bed-clothes at the bottom of the bed interrupted, "Cross him off the list God." And as Jane continued with her requests for blessing upon other members of the family, Jimmy shouted out in disgust, "God, cross them all off the list."

Now supposing God had answered this impetuous prayer of Jimmy's, what then? Thank God He has no favourites, but is rich in grace to all. O the unsearchable riches of the grace of God. One can well marvel at it, because there are times when one would

have said to God, "Not them Lord, they don't deserve Your blessing," but God has greatly blessed them. God is sovereign in all His ways, but because we are confined to human limitations we try to measure God's thoughts and actions by our own.

# "The Trumpet Shall Sound"

Although world tension has eased a little the prospect of world peace is still uncertain. However, whatever may develop in the near or distant future, one thing is absolutely certain, the trumpet will sound, indicating the return of the Saviour for His own (1 Thess. 4:16, 17). This is the encouraging, stimulating and inspiring hope of the Christian Church, for accompanying "the shout of the Lord" and "the voice of the archangel," will be the sound of the trumpet heralding the rapture of the Church to meet the Lord in the air.

Many Bible expositors believe that, significantly enough, this trumpet is related to the one referred to as the last trumpet in 1 Corinthians 15:51, 52, and consider it to be an allusion to a practise of the Roman soldiery in Paul's day. When they had to move, a first trumpet was sounded and immediately tents were struck, baggage packed, beasts laden, and everything made ready to move at a moment's notice. At the sounding of the second trumpet the soldiers fell into line, and at the blowing of the third and last trumpet they began to march. Whatever the sounding of the other trumpets may mean in that great day, one thing is certain, at the sounding of the last trumpet the Church will be raptured. It will be the signal heralding that meeting in the air. It will be the crowning event of this Christian dispensation. This event may take place at any moment, for the signs of the times indicate that its glorious shadow is already upon us. The hands of God's timepiece have almost met at midnight, and the hour of a new day, the day of the Saviour's coming again, is about to strike. This is the real hope of the Christian Church, the "blessed hope" as Paul called it.

What a triumphant and glorious coming that will be when the Lord's people are caught up to meet the Saviour in the air. The Master said concerning it that He would return in His own glory, and the glory of His Father, and of the holy angels (Luke 9:26). On the great Day of Atonement the high priest of Israel put off his robes of glory and beauty,

and appeared in a spotlessly white garment to sacrifice to God on behalf of himself and the people. At His first advent the Lord Jesus laid aside His imperial majesty and kingly garments, and clothing Himself with sinless flesh offered Himself a perfect sacrifice to God at Calvary, after which He rose from the dead and ascended into heaven as our High Priest. But as the high priest of Israel on his return from the Holiest of Holies, the place of God's presence, again put on his robes of glory, so the Lord Jesus returning for His own will manifest Himself in glory and beauty.

Christian reader, amidst the wickedness and confusion of our day in the affairs of men and nations, are you living and working for the Lord in the light of the Saviour's coming again? Until that day it is the obligation and imperative business of the members of the Church of Jesus Christ to stand together as a solid phlanx against all the forces of evil, at the same time doing all that is possible to lead men and women to the Saviour.

# Children's Strip

Lessons From Big and Little Creatures
8.—THE ELEPHANT

Hello Boys and Girls,

This week we are going to learn a lesson from a very big creature—the elephant. Have you ever heard the saying "An elephant never forgets?" I guess you have. Well, a friend of mine has sent me a story for our Strip, which certainly seems to prove this saying is true.

Away in Burma a great forest was being cleared, and elephants were used for carting away the timber. Now the Burmese who were doing this job were not very good workers. Sometimes they would work just for an hour or two and then take a long, long rest, and at other times they would work for hours on end and then have a rest. Of course, whenever they took the notion to stop work the elephants had a rest too. At last this part of the forest was cleared, and the elephants were sent away to work for another gang of men. Now these men were all Christians, and they worked hard every day, only stopping for their meals, but on Sunday they stopped

work and rested all day, and the elephants were rested too. This job lasted many months and the elephants got quite used to the camp routine. However, at last this job was finished too, and once more the elephants were sent to another part to work for a different gang of men. These men were unsaved, like the first gang, and were very irregular in their work hours. Of course, Sunday meant nothing to them, and so when it came round they prepared to do a bit of work as usual, but what a surprise they got. Would those elephants budge? Not an inch! The men pushed and pricked and prodded and shouted at them, but not an elephant would move. For so long they had been given one day's rest in every seven that they had grown to expect it, and knew when their rest was due; they were determined to have it. Those Burmese workmen just had to give up in despair, knock off work for the day, and rest until the next day, when they found the elephants were willing and docile and ready to cart the timber away.

What a lesson there is for us here. When God made the earth, He made it in six days and rested on the seventh. In the Bible we are told that we must work for six days and rest on the seventh. If we work hard all the week our bodies need one day's complete rest before we start another week's work. This helps to keep our bodies healthy. Then, too, we must remember that for six days we work and look after ourselves, but the seventh day is the Lord's Day and we should spend it in His house worshipping and praising Him for all His goodness to us. I hope as you grow up you will always think of this, and whatever happens remember the Lord's day to keep it holy.

Pastor Lawrence Lambert described the new Elim Church at Prospect Hill, Kidderminster, on Saturday, as a very beautiful place of worship. He was speaking at an open air service before the church was officially opened. He said that two years ago when he came to the town as the resident Elim minister some people thought the Elim Movement was a little "over-optimistic" in thinking they would soon have their own place of worship. It was nearly two-and-ahalf years since the Movement came to Kidderminster when the first crusade was led by the Rev. Ken Matthew and party. The average congregation at that time was only about 100. Now the Sunday attendance was 200. Mr. Lambert said it gave him quite a thrill to think they now had their own permanent church in the town.

Prayers were led by Mr. Lambert and a large gathering sang and prayed in the open air before the doors of the new church, built at a cost of nearly £9,000,



were opened for the first time. The simple one-storey, flat roofed building looked impressive in the bright sunshine. Its facade is of large glass sheets set in narrow wooden frames. Two of these sheets are of green opaque glass, and they are balanced by a large white cross set into the wall on the opposite side of the building.

The assembly stood in prayer for a few seconds before the doors were unlocked.

The building of the new church began in August of last year, when the difficult job of clearing the ground was begun. Five thousand tons of earth had to be moved and a force of voluntary labour tackled the work. Four months later, on a grey day early in December, the resident minister laid the foundation stone.

At the end of the open air service on Saturday Mr. Lambert welcomed Pastor Ken Matthew, who was to perform the opening ceremony. He took a key from the architect, Mr. David Burgess, and unlocked the doors of the new church. The congregation then proceeded into the large hall of the church where a second service was conducted.

THIS IS A STORY of the ultimate triumph ■ of love over hatred. Here is portrayed goodness prevailing against evil. It is an old story illustrating and foreshadowing a new truth—the truth of the grace of God, victorious over sin and Satan. Saul (asked for) king of Israel, had a son whom he named Jonathan (gift of Jehovah). Jonathan had a son whom he named Mephibosheth (exterminating shame, or shameful thing). Although Mephibosheth was born a normal child, at the age of five years stark tragedy overtook him. After the long war between the house of Saul and the house of David, during which David waxed stronger and stronger, while Saul waxed weaker and weaker, a decisive victory came to David. The whole kingdom swung over to him and he was anointed king over Israel in Saul's place (2 Sam. 5:3). So it came about, through fear that David would retaliate on the house of Saul his many injuries and insults received from that jealous and selfish king, that Mephibosheth's nurse fled with him to a place of safety. Unfortunately, in the panicstricken rush, the lad fell and sustained serious injuries which resulted in his being permanently lame in both feet. How appropriate was his name! What disconcerting destiny was in its meaning!-" exterminating shame!" He, through whose veins coursed royal blood, who was in royal line, of whom dignity and deportment was expected, by a fall became a "shameful thing," lame in both feet. What a stigma on such a high personage and of such important destiny! What a shock and surprise to his possible subjects! And, as if to complete the picture of dismal despair, his nurse took him to hide in the house of Machir (sold), in Lodebar (no word; without pasture). In that place and plight Mephibosheth would have remained in his shame: sold, destitute, forgotten but for the loving remembrance and kindness of King David (beloved).

When David came to power he remembered his unique friendship with Jonathan, whose love to him was "surpassing the love of women." By such love Jonathan had rescued David repeatedly from the treachery and hatred of Saul, who often would have vented his spite on David to his great harm and even death but

for the intervention and ingenuity of Jonathan. This kindly treatment David remembered when he came into his own, and instead of bearing a grudge and perpetuating the bad feeling that existed between the two houses, he sought to heal the breach by demonstrating his appreciation in practical terms. (How unlike the butler's belated remembrance of Joseph's kindness!). And David said: "Is there yet any that is left of the house of Saul, that I may shew him kindness for Jonathan's sake?" (2 Sam. 9:1). This was none other than "the kindness (grace) of God" (v. 3).

Now the link between David and Mephibosheth was Ziha (plant), a servant of Saul's house. He made David aware of Mephibosheth's existence and extremity, so that the unfortunate man was brought into David's presence.

Note how Mephibosheth met David. "He fell on

his face, and did reverence," and said: "Behold thy servant!" (v. 6). Then David reassured him with his gracious intentions: "Fear not: for I will surely shew thee kindness for Jonathan thy father's sake, and will restore thee all the land of Saul thy (grand-) father; and thou shalt eat bread at my table continually" (v. 7). With great and sincere humility Mephibosheth replied: "What is thy servant, that thou shouldest look upon such a dead dog as I am?"

Look again at the promise and provision made by David. Kindness; restoration of lost territory; a continual supply of daily bread; housing in the king's palace at Jerusalem, and a status as one of the king's sons (vv. 7, 10, 11).

This illuminating story further reveals that Mephibosbeth had a son whom he called Micha, which meant, "who is like unto Jehovah." We are later informed that although Mephibosheth was guilty of

failure (despite all the love that had been shown him), upon his confession and repentance he was freely forgiven by David, whose promise of peace and plenty held good in spite of Mephibosheth's faults and failings. It would appear that this very failure, and the forgiveness received, proved the making of Mephibosheth, for it is recorded that he rose above the mere thoughts of David's provision, and really appreciated David for his own sake: "Let him (the servant) take all since my lord the king has come back in safety" (19:30, Mostatt).

Thus it was that Mcphibosheth was rescued, restored, and kept by David's promise, power, and provision all the days of his life. Though he remained lame, he resided at Jerusalem, as one of the king's sons—his lameness, shame, and reproach covered by the table; his need met by the grace of God through David, the beloved.

4:4; 9:1-13).

What a picture of sinful man and the Saving Sovereign! How history repeats itself! Man (Mephibosheth) was made in the image of God. There was royal lineage potential in him. But like Mephibosheth (at the age of discretion) the consequences of the Fall became evident, and sin taking advantage caused him to fall short of the glory of God: to be "lame in both feet", altogether out of the way and unprofitable, "sold under sin", with a sense of exterminating shame, in a place of "no word" and "no pasture", for so great and far-reaching is the effect of sin that there is no way back apart from the grace of God.

The feet, in Bible terminology, have reference to the walk and way of a person, group, or nation. Thus for one to be lame in the feet the inference would be that the way and walk of that one is not as it should be. The feet can take one into strange and even sinful places, where all peace and joy are lost. Israel's backsliding feet took that nation down into Babylon, where there was nothing but sorrow and suffering, loss and lamentation. The prophet echoed the Divine word by saying: "This is the way, walk ye in it." Our Lord says to all men: "I am the way... no man cometh unto the Father but by Me."

At this juncture the application of the story focuses upon our Saviour, "great David's greater Son." His house waxes stronger and stronger, while Satan's house weakens. His days are indeed numbered, his downfall is predicted, he is already a beaten foe. God has anointed the Lord Jesus Christ, and has given Him a Name which is above every Name, and to Him gather all who are in debt, distress, or discontented, as they did to David. The Saviour is the exalted one, and every knee shall bow before Him, and every tongue must confess Him Lord to the glory of the Father. How precious it to realise that Jesus Christ desires to show the grace of God unto the house of Saul, for His own Name's sake! He remembers that we are "frail children of dust, and feeble as frail", for did He not take on the likeness of man, the form of Abraham, and being tempted on all points as we, yet without sin, He is now able to succour them that are tempted, seeing that He ever lives to make intercession for them.

The evil spirit of Satan entered the heart of Saul and he persecuted David. Satan also had designs on the life of Jesus. The Gospels record several dastardly attempts by Satan on that sacred Life: at His birth, during His ministry, among the crowds, on the lake, in the desert, and by the Cross. He was hunted and hounded, without home and shelter, like David of old, yet He was delivered by God again and again, and finally being raised from the dead He reigns enthroned in highest heaven. He had those who loved Him and cared for His safety. Those whom He loved into loving Him.

Ziba could be likened to the Holy Spirit (the servant, the plant) who is in the world to convict men of sin, of righteousness, and of judgment. Does not He know where each and (Continued on page 331)

ARE YOUR FEET UNDER THE TABLE?—Cntd. every man is, even though hiding in sin and shame, in fear and frustration, without hope or help in this world? It is the Spirit who discovers men and conducts them to the Saviour (John 3:5-8), assuring them of His kindly interest in them. Yes, even when sold under sin, hidden away in the very wastes of human barrenness, there is One who makes intercession for them "with groanings which cannot be uttered."

And what of the rescued sinner's approach unto the Saviour? It should be as Mephibosheth's approach to David, with reverence, humility, and self-confession. Is not Jesus Christ "the King of Kings, and Lord of Lords"? Are we not as "dead dogs" by reason of our sin and shame? But what dignity and delightfulness belong to the Beloved! What love and mercy He displays! He speaks peace to the troubled heart. He promises provision and plenty to the poverty-stricken, sin-sick soul. A continual daily supply of grace is assured at the King's table and with the King's sons. "Come . . . and rest." "Come and dine." "I am the Bread of Life." And with many other lovely phrases He puts us at ease and tranquilises our souls.

We also have the power of reproduction. We can bring others into the kingdom by the Gospel, and every soul brought to Christ and saved by His power after our conversion and by our ministry, causes us to say "Who is like Jehovah."

Then, too, the Holy Spirit works for us to restore all we have lost, and to provide for our continual enrichment of grace and glory day by day.

There are times, however, when we fail and are false to our King, but the Word says: "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness (1 John 1:9). Sometimes our failure, after confession has been made and forgiveness has been received, even brings us into a closer fellowship with our Lord, it having revealed to us the singular and unspeakable preciousness of our Beloved. One then

wants Him and desires to serve Him for His sake rather than for that which He provides

> "Once it was the blessing, Now it is the Lord; Once the gifts I wanted, Now the GIVER own."

The secret of Mephibosheth's peace of mind and plentiful supply of means was in the fact that the table covered his feet. His blemishes and defects were hidden. That which could be seen of him was equal to that which was to be found in the king's sons. He shared the same table, sampled the same food, and saw the same king.

How we need the protection and covering of the table, the King's table, brought nigh by the precious atoning blood of the Lamb! Even the seraphims had to cover their feet with their wings (Isa. 6) in the presence of the Lord, high and lifted up. How much more necessary is it for us to have our feet, the cause of our exterminating shame, covered by the King's grace and mercy!

It is there, at His table, and there only can we lose our sense of being "shameful things." There, and only there, are we "as the King's sons", and there, with our feet under the table, all blemishes covered; there—and nowhere else—can we look on the face of the Lord who rescued, ransomed and restored us, "lost in wonder, love, and praise." It is by virtue of the Lord's Table that we partake of the Divine bounty all the days of our lives. "Though lame, he resided at Jerusalem," and we too may "dwell in the house of the Lord for ever."

One last thought remains. It is there also, that the feet of our fellow-believers are covered. We indeed become "all one in Christ." "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature." "Henceforth I know no man after the flesh." It ill-behoves us to look under the table at any human weakness or deformity when we can delight ourselves with the loveliness around and upon the table, and the exquisite beauty of the Beloved, our Host, presiding at the table.

## The Family Altar Elim Prayer Circle

Scripture Union Portions. Notes by Pastor Eldin Corsie.

SUNDAY, May 26th. Psalm 6: 1-10.

"The Lord will receive my prayer" (v. 9).

This Psalm is reminiscent of the book of Job. David is penitent because he felt the chastening hand of God (v. 1). (Heb. 12: 5-11). He suffers sickness of the body, trouble of the mind and the insults of his enemies. Out of his extremity he cries to God, and the trouble is turned to triumph, the pain to praise. David was the true penitent (see Psalms 32, 38, 51, 102, 130, 143). Has our repentance been watered with tears (v. 6). Remember, Peter "went out and wept bitterly." Beware of tearless prayers and prayerless tears!

MONDAY, May 27th. Psalm 7: 1-17.

"My defence is of God" (v. 10).

The answer to the slanderer's tongue is not a solicitor's letter, but a firm and unshakeable trust in God. This is the explicit message of the Psalm. David does not argue with his enemies but tells God all about them. Mischief and slander are sure "boomerangs" (v. 16). When slandered tell God about it and then praise the Lord! (v. 17).

TUESDAY, May 28th. Psalm 8: 1-9.

"O Lord how excellent is Thy Name . . ." (v. 1).

Here is a meditation on, and adoration of, the glory and greatness of God. God's glory shines out throughout this world (v. 1). God's glory came down in Christ and has gone to "all the earth" (Mark 16: 15, 16). The glory of God is manifested in the heavens too—"who hast set thy glory upon the heavens" (R.V.). Even the weakest of creatures portrays the glory of God (v. 2; Matt. 21: 16). David then goes on to magnify the honour of God, by recounting the honours He has put upon men, especially the man Christ Jesus. How wonderfully God has condescended in favour and love to man in making Jesus a little lower than the angels. His works and His love reveal His glory!

WEDNESDAY, May 29th. Psalm 9: 1-20.

"Sing praises to the Lord" (v. 11).

Thank God for an Intercessor (v. 4) and a Conqueror (vv. 5, 6). These facts should call forth praise (vv. 1, 2). The wicked are to enter the gates of death (v. 13); the righteous the gates of heaven (v. 14). How different! Here is a picture of the final destruction of all anti-Christian powers. Verse 18 reminds the children of God to be patient and wait for His deliverance. What a promise in verse 10! Only the people of God have a refuge in the time of trouble.

THURSDAY, May 30th. Psalm 24: 1-10. "The Lord of hosts, He is the King of glory" (v. 10). Psalm 22 outlines the sufferings of Christ. Psalm 23, Christ as the guide and provision of the Christian. Psalm 24 prophesies the coming of Christ to reign. Past, present, and future of the spiritual experience. Read 2 Samuel 5. This is the background to the Psalm. The character and charter of the kingdom of Christ are given in verses 4-6. He comes to take the kingdom of your heart; have you let Him in? (vv. 7-10). He comes ultimately, in power and great glory to take possession of the kingdoms of this world. Are you ready to herald Him?

FRIDAY, May 31st. Psalm 25: 1-11.

"Unto Thee, O Lord, do I lift up my soul" (v. 1).

Here again David pours out his heart to God. This is a real example of prayer. His heart rises to God like a fountain. (1) He professes his utter dependence upon God, and begs for the benefit and comfort of that dependence. (2) God will direct us if we desire to know His will (vv. 4, 5). How dependant David is upon the mercy of God; he ever realises he has no merit of his own (v. 6). David is specific in his confession of sin (v. 7). God's servant leans heavily upon the staff of the promises of his Lord (vv. 8-11). What is the measure of our dependence upon God?

SATURDAY, June 1st. Psalm 25: 12-22.

"The secret of the Lord is with them that fear Him" (v. 14). Those that fear the Lord choose the things that please Him (v. 12). There will be peace and prosperity (vv. 13). God will admit the God-fearing into special communion with Himself (v. 14). "Shall I hide from Abraham the thing that I do?" (Gen. 18: 17. Compare John 7: 17). David encourages himself by recalling the blessings God would shower upon him (vv. 15-21). Again we are brought face to face with David's complete confidence and trust in God.

# THE UNGUARDED HOUR

By Evangelist DICK HALL

TRAGEDY IS ALL AROUND! How true it is that we as Christians so often forget that all around us is tragedy. Human tragedy in which we ourselves could become involved far more easily than we think, despite the fact that it is not necessary, in fact against the will of God.

In Matthew 26 we have a most interesting point revealed; in connection with this thought, verses 36-46 tell of that great moment of our Lord's agony in the Garden of Gethsemane.

Here He gave His three disciples a charge. He said unto them "TARRY YE HERE AND WATCH WITH ME." Watch, notice. He told them to watch. He placed them on sentry duty. Now notice His apparent surprise at finding them asleep. Verse 40, "What, could ye not watch with me one hour?" Watch and pray that ye enter not into temptation. They proved to be poor sentries for Him.

Disaster could have overtaken them. Satan was abroad. It was the hour of darkness. The conflict of the ages was about to take place, and they were asleep.

Have you noticed that many people in the past have failed just like that.

Joshua's defeat at Ai was caused by the same thing. At Jericho he and his army were invincible. Why? Because before he attacked he got his explicit orders from the Lord. But before Ai he wasn't even conscious that there was sin in the camp. It was Joshua's "Unguarded Hour."

Abraham left off watching and praying and commenced to slide down to Egypt, and finished up by being "told off" for lying, by a heathen king. Abraham had his unguarded hour.

The first part of David's life is a thrill to read about. No matter what Saul the king tried he just could not catch David napping. In the palace, David dodged the flying javelin. In the cave David cuts

the fringe of Saul's garment while he sleeps. In the open David removes the cruse of water while Saul sleeps.

Saul could not trap him. David was alert, on the watch. But when we read on and come to 2 Samuel 11 we are surprised to read these words, "Now it came to pass that after the year was expired, at the time when kings go forth to battle, that David sent Joab . . . But David tarried still at Jerusalem."

We all know the story only too well, don't we? The darkest and most dreadful chapter in the history of this great man. That terrible day of which it is recorded, AT EVENTIDE DAVID ROSE FROM HIS BED AND WALKED UPON THE ROOF.

That was David's "Unguarded Hour."

In that fearful moment when he was not watching, the enemy dealt him a crippling blow from which he never fully recovered.

An unguarded hour is a danger spot. Beware! David's job was out on the battlefield! Christian, so is yours!

By way of contrast, look for a moment at Nehemiah. The book opens with Nehemiah at prayer (v. 4). And as we follow him through we see that he is a man who did all things with prayer. He was continuously on the watch.

He and his men knew the power of the enemy, so they worked with a tool in one hand and a sword in the other. And no matter what the enemy did, they couldn't surprise him, nor scare him, trap him. entreat him, trick him, deflect him or move him. He had no "unguarded hour." And the last words he is recorded as uttering are the last words of the book and they are addressed to God, "Remember me, O my God, for good" (Neh. 13:31). Nehemiah is a perfect type of the Spirit-filled victorious Christian.

Satan waits to strike the moment we are off our

guard. I remember being told long before I was converted, of the famous fight that took place many years ago between Corbett and Fitzsimmons. It was a contest for the world title in the prize ring. They said that Corbett was a wonder of science, while all Fitzsimmons had was brawn and weight. It was hardly a contest, as Fitzsimmons hardly registered a hit, so clever was his opponent; until Corbett caught sight of the movie camera following him. From that moment he "turned on" all the brilliance of his studied art and was doing well, when, almost unconsciously, he took his eye off Fitzsimmons. In that unguarded second, the world title was transferred to Fitzsimmons. He won with one crushing blow that never should have landed.

So we are exhorted to watch. Remember, one unguarded hour could mean the end of our usefulness as a witness for Christ. I have seen this happen. I know people who were once brilliant preachers who are a hindrance to the Gospel today.

They fell in their unguarded hour.

Notice what the Lord Jesus says in Matthew 24:41, "Watch and pray that ye enter not into temptation."

I once thought that to be tempted was not sin; only the giving way to the temptation was sin. But I was wrong. Here it is SIN to enter into temptation.

To be so unwatchful that temptation has come upon me and I find myself in the midst of it, trying perhaps to escape from it, almost before I realise it, that is Sin.

It is the same kind of sin that a soldier commits who is placed on duty as a sentry and goes to sleep and wakes up to find himself captive in the hands of his enemy and his camp invaded.

- 1. We are to watch and pray that we enter not into temptation.
- 2. We are to watch and pray because our adversary the Devil goeth about seeking whom he may devour (1 Pet. 5:8).
  - 3. We are to be watchful lest we fall (I Cor. 10: 12).
- 4. We are to become watchful lest we become weak (1 Cor. 16:13).
- 5. We are to be watchful, because our Lord may return at any moment (Matt. 25:13).

We are not at play but at war. Truceless Warfare! Let us have no "unguarded hour."

### THE MASTER MOVE


