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
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

Come. FOR ALL THINGS ARE NOW MADE READY By ALMA NEWSOME

"Then said He unto him, A certain man made a great supper, and bade many: and sent his servant at supper time to say to them that were bidden, Come; for all things are now ready. And they all with one consent begat to make excuse. The first said unto him, I have bought a piece of ground, and I must needs go and see it: I pray thee have me excused. And another said, I have bought five yoke of oxen, and I go to prove them: I pray thee have me excused. And another said, I have married a wife, and therefore I cannot come" (Luke 14: 16-20).

JESUS IS GIVING THE INVITATION today for the great supper; He is giving the invitation to one and all; but, like the people in the parable, excuses are plentiful. Listen to some of the excuses offered today, and hear what God has to say in answer to them.

- 1. I am a church member. Church membership alone does not save. The great question is, "Have you been born again; are you showing by your life that you are a child of God?" Jesus said to Nicodemus: "Ye must be born again" (John 3.7).
- 2. I am good enough! Are you? The Bible teaches us that "all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23), and in verse 10, we read, "There is none righteous, no, not one." Outside of Christ there is no righteousness.
- 3. I am not very bad. Again, I give you a verse from the Word of God: "There is none that doeth good, no, not one" (Psa. 14:3).
- 4. I am not good enough to be a Christian. If this is your excuse, my friend, hear Jesus as He says: "They that be whole need not a physician, but they that are sick. But go ye and learn what that meaneth, I will have mercy, and not sacrifice: for I am not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance" (Matt. 9:12, 13). And in Titus 3:5, Paul writes: "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saves us."
- 5. I am too great a sinner. Friend of mine, if you are standing on this excuse, you are on a very weak foundation. Hear the prophet Isaiah as he brings forth his great invitation: "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts: and let him return unto the Lord, and He will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon" (Isa. 55:7). Furthermore, Jesus says, "All that the Father giveth Me shall come to Me; and him that cometh to Me I

will in no wise cast out" (John 6:37). Paul, in his letter to the Hebrews, says: "Wherefore He is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make intercession for them" (Heb. 7:25).

- 6. Not now! How often we hear this flimsy little excuse, "Not now." I can almost hear Felix as he made the same excuse to Paul. Felix trembled under the impact of Paul's testimony, but he said to Paul: "Go thy way for this time; when I have a convenient season, I will call for thee" (Acts 24:25). You say, "Not now"; God says, "Today." "Today if ye will hear His voice, harden not your hearts, as in the provocation" (Heb. 3:15). And Genesis 6:3, "And the Lord said, My spirit shall not always strive with man." If you are hanging on to this excuse, turn it loose quickly and heed the admonition of Amos the prophet, when he said: "Prepare to meet thy God" (Amos 4:12).
- 7. There are church members no better than I am! I believe this is the most frequently used of all excuses. I have heard sinners say, "I wouldn't be a member of such-and-such a church; there are too many hypocrites in it." Did you not know, my sinner friend, that the so-called hypocrite stands between you and Christ, if this is your excuse? Let me give you what God thinks about your excuse. "Judge not, that ye be not judged. For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again. And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Or how wilt thou say to thy brother, Let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and behold, a beam is in thine own eye? Thou hypocrite, first cast out the beam out of thine own eye; and then shalt thou see clearly to cast out the mote out of thy brother's eye" (Matt. 7:1-5). Need I go further to prove your excuse is vain?
- 8. My companions keep me from Christ. My dear sinner friend, I am very sorry for you if this is the excuse you have to offer. If your companions would keep you from Christ, then you are in need of better companions. Do you know that Jesus is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother? The Psalmist David said: "Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the

way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful" (Psa. 1:1). Solomon said, "Enter not into the path of the wicked, and go not in the way of evil men" (Prov. 4:14, 15). We turn now to the New Testament to prove you are inexcusable! "Be ye not nnequally yoked together with unbelievers: for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion hath light with darkness?" (2 Cor. 6:14).

9. I cannot surrender all; there's too much to give up. Can you not give up some things for Christ who gave His all for you? "For whosoever will save his life shall lose it: and whosoever will lose his life for My sake shall find it" (Matt. 16:25). Paul gave up all for Christ: hear him as he speaks in Philippiaus 3:7, "But what things were gain to me, those I counted loss for Christ."

10. The Christian life is too hard; I cannot hold out. Let us see what God's Word tells us about this excuse. Turn with me to 1 John 5:3, 4: "For this is the love of God, that we keep His commandments: and His commandments are not grievous. For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world; and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith." You must daily seek His guidance; you must confess Him if you expect to keep the victory.

Sinner friends, when you stand before the great "I AM," you will not dare to offer an excuse. Even if you should, excuses will not stand in that day. If you expect to make it into the heavenly city and partake of the great supper of the Lamb, you must make preparations now. In Matthew 11:28, Jesus invites you, "Come unto me." So, friends, throw away the excuse you may be clinging to and accept the wonderful invitation now!

HAVOC IN THE MORAL REALM

There is a grave and genuine fear throughout the world of the possibility of nuclear warfare, and rightly so. There is, however, in tragic contrast to this, a callous indifference to the moral havoc being wrought by sin among the nations of the earth, for the masses of mankind are content to remain its victims and slaves. It is this that accounts for the greed, utter selfishness, the awful sinfulness, the lust for power, and the crazy unreasonableness in the world today.

Before Adam fell, spiritual reason held the throne of his life and was the inviolable rule of his affections. In that condition he enjoyed nature in its original purity and crowned with the benediction of God before it was blasted by the curse. Through the Fall sin became assertive and degenerative in mankind. The Lord Jesus reckoned sin to be of awful magnitude and guilt, because of the havoc it had wrought in man since the time of the fall of Adam from his sinless state. He vividly illustrated its workings by the parable of the leaven. "... The kingdom of heaven is like unto leaven, which a woman took and hid in three measures of meal, till the whole was leavened" (Matt. 13:33). Here He shows that leaven, like sin, is a foreign importation, causing a state of degeneracy in that into which it enters. Leaven is a small piece of fermenting dough which, placed in a cake of meal, will produce fermentation in it, and consequently the unleavened cake becomes leavened. The leaven so works in the unleavened meal that it alters its whole quality by communicating its own property into the mixture. In this we have a vivid portrayal of the fall of Adam through sin, and the resultant consequences in himself and the human family. Since that day sin has been working disastrously in the human race. This view of the Master, in conjunction with His detailed teaching about sin, defeats and destroys the science or hypothesis of those who would have us believe that man never fell, but is evolving and ever progressing to perfection.

A psychological proof to men and women of the existence and power of sin is its obvious presence and activity in their own lives, which affects them mentally, morally and physically.

It is amazing to realise that men and women who consider liberty their dearest right are content to remain the slaves of sin. They will fight to the death for social, national and political liberty, yet they remain the victims of the worst slavery on earth—the slavery of sin. When the message of salvation is presented to them they reject it with indifference. Science teaches that when a man becomes the victim of narcotic poisoning, and is becoming unconscious, he dislikes to be handled by those who seek to rouse him from sinking into an insidious slumber. This illustrates only too clearly the sad state of unsaved humanity, who strongly resent the message of the Gospel which seeks to rouse them from their spiritual slumber.

All this constitutes a challenge to Christians everywhere to intensify and multiply their efforts in seeking to win men and women for the Master.

Revival Among Continental Gipsies.

In recent years a remarkable stir has been caused among the Gipsies of France because of a spiritual revival that has caused thousands of them to accept Christ and become aggressive witnesses for Him. The number of those saved and baptised in water now reaches 3,000.

Gideon Distribution reaches Thirty-Five Million.

The Gideons International, an association of Christian business men, has now reached the thirty-five-million mark in distributing Bibles and Testaments. In commemoration the international president, Mr. P. J. Zondervan, of Grand Rapids, Mich., presented a special leather Bible to Mr. George McSwain, assistant to the executive vice-president of Hilton Hotels, Inc. The ceremony was held on April 3rd on the top of the 3,000-room Hilton Hotel in Chicago, world's largest hotel. —Alliance Weekly.

Takes Survey of Evangelicals in Japan.

Kenny Joseph, editor of Japan Harvest, has made a survey of evangelical strength in Japan and tabulated these statistics: In Japan among evangelicals there are 107,073 baptised church members, 178,848

adherents, 1,307 ordained pastorevangelists, and 688 unordained full-time workers. These evangelicals meet in 1,619 organised churches and 1,249 other meeting places.

Mr. Joseph contacted some 69 Japanese groups and 90 missionary organisations (including the Assemblies of God) in making the survey.

There is power in Gospel song!

Years ago George Charlton was travelling by train to Alnwick, Northumberland, England, where he was scheduled to lecture.

In the train were a drunken man, his wife, and a boy just entering his teens. The drunken man was quarrelsome and was making a nuisance of himself to everyone in the compartment. His poor wife tried her best to keep him quiet, but without avail. Noting the embarrassment of the woman, and wanting to help if he could, Mr. Charlton asked the man if he might sing to him. To this the man readily agreed. Mr. Charlton sang a song. Intoxicated as the man was, he asked for another song. This time the singer chose an old well-known hymn. The effect of the words upon the drunken man was noticeable to all in the compartment.

Now the train reached its destination and Mr. Charlton with the man and his wife and son alighted. The woman thanked Mr. Charlton heartly.

It was many years afterward that Mr. Charlton was invited to lecture in Alnwick. A fine-looking gentleman met him at the station to escort him to the auditorium where he was to lecture.

It had been a custom in the north of England to have "tea parties," as they call them, in their chapels, and an address or lecture to follow. On this occasion Mr. Charlton was invited to tea.

A typical English matron was very attentive, loading his plate with all the good things that had been provided. He noticed also that the gentleman who had met him at the station was paying much attention

to his wants. This naturally aroused his curiostity and he called the lady to his side, asking, "Who is that fine-looking gentleman?"

"That gentleman is my husband," she replied graciously, "one of the elders of the Presbyterian Church. Mr. Charlton, do you remember many years ago singing for a drunken man to keep him quiet?"

"Why, yes I do," answered Mr. Charlton.

"Well, sir, that is the man, and I am the poor woman who thanked you for singing that sweet old hymn which led him to see the error of his ways. He gave his heart to God, and so did I, sir, because of the impression that singing made on us. We now have the happiest home in the north of England. TODAY to many people the Church is only a byword, but to those who know it as the greatest living organism the world has ever known, it is a highword.

The writer well remembers when as a small boy riding in a pony-trap with a relative, we picked up the Vicar and he said: "Mr. Walker, what church do you belong to?" and the reply was: "The General Assembly and Church of the firstborn, Sir, whose names are written in heaven." "Yes, yes," said the Vicar, "but tell me, what is your persuasion?" and like a flash came the reply: "You will find my persuasion, sir, in the 8th chapter of Romans: 'For I am persuaded that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come. GLORIOUS IN ITS PURPOSE


So many fail because they lose sight of the purpose of the Church. Well may we sing: "Dare to be a Daniel, dare to stand alone, dare to have a **purpose** firm, and dare to make it known." I will only mention four of the purposes of the Church.

(1) The Church is the custodian of the Word of God. Men and women gave their lives that God's Word should be passed on to us in all its purity, and we in our turn should see that it is preserved and passed on unharmed by Higher Criticism and Modernism. (2) The Church is a witness to the Virgin Birth, spotless life, atoning death, resurrection and soon returning Lord Jesus. (3) The business of the Church is to save souls, and this business isn't nearly finished yet. (4) The Church is a nursery for Christians where they can be taught to grow in grace and in the knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ, and also to know experimentally the great truths of consecration and sanctification. R. B. Jones of Wales once said: "If saints are sanctified, souls will be saved as a natural consequence.

Again, this Church is:

GLORIOUS IN ITS POWER

What an apparent risk Christ took when He entrusted His work to twelve weak men and later to His Church which was to be as an army, terrible with banners. This Church of which it was predicted "The gates of hell shall not prevail against it." This Church which was to preach the Gospel of the kingdom in all the world. This Church that was to observe and teach all things that Christ commanded. All this entrusted to twelve weak men, and they were weak, for one denied Him, one doubted Him, one betrayed Him, and as Dr. Boreham says; "The last tragic word about them before Calvary was, 'They all forsook Him and fled'."



The reason Christ could leave the outworking of His great purpose and plan to the twelve who became part of the Church formed on the day of Pentecost, was because He knew the power He was going to bestow on them. Just before His ascension they asked the question: "Lord, wilt Thou at this time restore the kingdom to Israel?" and He said unto them: "It is not for you to know the times and seasons which the Father hath put in His own power. But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto Me both in Jerusalem and in all Judæa, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the carth" (Acts 1: 6-8). What a glorious day of power that was for the Church and what a difference it made. Peter, standing up with the eleven, preached that wonderful sermon that added 3,000 to the Church. No longer did the disciples fear, no longer were they

weak, no longer did they want to run away. Boldly, courageously, they went everywhere witnessing for their Master, and from that time God has never withdrawn that power from the Church. Luther, Wesley, Whitfield, Moody, General Booth, and a host of others, have all demonstrated this spiritual power. Moody tells us how two elderly ladies used to sit in the front of his meetings praying and shaking their heads, and one day he asked them what they were doing and to his astonishment they said that they were praying that he might receive the power of the Holy Spirit. Moody says he wasn't too pleased about this. Was he not having considerable success as an evangelist? Then he tells how one day God put His hand upon him. He took a room in an hotel, and God met him there in a wonderful way. His experience was so marvellous that he was not able to describe it.

S CHURCH

VALKER (Minister of the Elim Church, Worthing)

He went preaching again, and the two elderly sisters were in their usual place, but now they were smiling and now they were nodding their heads. "He's got it." Moody had received the power of the Holy Spirit, and although he said he preached the same kind of sermons, yet thousands were brought to Christ. Truly the Church is glorious in its power.

Further, this Church is:

GLORIOUS IN ITS PURITY

Immediately we begin to talk about holiness many people look uncomfortable and often begin to visualise black stockings, black ties, and sombre clothes, but holiness is not the clothes you wear. It is "A heart in every thought renewed, and full of love divine, perfect and right and pure and good, a copy, Lord, of Thine." "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God." The pure heart was the goal of

Calvary. The pure heart was the climax of the work of Jesus Christ. Let us try and get it into our hearts and minds, that this is what our Lord wants to do with us all—a heart in every thought renewed.

Some people have very hard hearts. There are people who go wrong, do wrong, break hearts, break up homes, and try to break up churches, and someone comes along and says: "He is good at heart." Friends, it is a lie; a person like that is bad at heart. Oh, that grace may everywhere abound and a Christlike spirit everywhere be found. Revival is coming by the personal testimony of clean hearts endued by the power of the Holy Spirit. "Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? or who shall stand in His holy Place He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart" (Psa. 24; 3-4). This is the scripture that inspired the Hebridian revival. It brought conviction to a deacon in one of the churches there, and realising his heart and hands were not clean before God he set about putting his heart and life right, and as we all know revival followed. This Church is glorious in its purity, and finally, the Church is

GLORIOUS IN ITS PROSPECT

A missionary on furlough happened to arrive at his home town station by the same train that brought home a famous athlete who had just broken a world's record. But this heading I read on the top of a letter I received from abroad. Let me give you the outline of it: "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct thy paths." What "good luck" has to do with this text I cannot see. The letter continued, "This prayer has been sent to you for good luck. It has been around the world four times, and the one who broke it had bad luck. The original came from the Netherlands. The luck of it has been sent to you. You are to have good luck four days after receiving it. This is not a joke. Please copy this and see what happens four days after receiving it. Send four copies to those to whom you wish good

luck. It must leave your hands twenty-four hours after receiving it. Insert your name at the bottom of the list, and then remove the top name." It includes names of famous people who have done this and within four days received a few thousand dollars.

No, I did not do what was asked of the reader, because I did not have faith in it. Luck is not in God's dealings with His children. He is working out a plan and purpose for each one, often realised in this life, but which in some cases will only be fully revealed in eternity.

It is very obvious by the horoscopes published in the newspapers and magazines, such as "Seeing Stars", "Your fate in the Stars", "The Stars and You", that generally people want to be sure of success and security. What puzzles me is, that "my star" tells me that the same thing which will revolve around my circumstances will also revolve around thousands of other people who are born under the same star.

God doesn't work by such ordinary methods. He guides, blesses and provides for each and every individual believer. What He plans and purposes in your life will not be the same as for mine. Therefore Romans 8:28 is a wonderful promise upon which we can depend. It incorporates all the promises of God and fits every circumstance in life. "My son wrote me only this week", a sister told me, "and said how he was learning the glorious truth of Romans 8:28."

Passing a church I read on the Wayside Pulpit poster, "Have patience. In all the promises of God there is never the word 'swiftly'."



Tracks In The Jungle

I am reading a book just now called Jungle Green. It is all about young soldier boys doing their two years National Service away out in the jungles of Malaya. One part interested me greatly. Whenever it was suspected that the bandits had gone a certain way, Dyak trackers were brought to that spot in the jungle, and there they would closely examine the place to see if they could discern any signs that showed which way the bandits had passed. Then our soldiers would follow in the trail and maybe capture the bandits.

Reading this made me think about the tracks we leave behind us every day for others to see. How nice it is for Father when he gets home from work to discover that the tool shed has been tidied up. "My word," he says, "young Jack cleared out the shed before he went off to play cricket." Or maybe

Mother comes in from shopping and finds the table is laid. "How nice," she exclaims, "Mary must have slipped in and laid the table for tea before she went out to play." Of course there is the other side. I am afraid sometimes Father comes in and says, "That lad must have borrowed my bike, and didn't put it away again and now its got wet in the rain."

As we walk through life let us make sure that we leave pleasant trails behind us, and

Scripture Union Portions. Notes by Pastor Kenneth Smith.

SUNDAY, July 7th. Acts 12: 1-10.

"Peter . . . in prison, but prayer was made without ceasing" (v. 5).

What a wonderful account, an imprisoned apostle released through the prayers of an interceding assembly. The purposes of God are often so different, for James was slain and Peter delivered. Hebrews 11 relates how some "escaped the edge of the sword" while others were "slain with the sword." In death or in deliverance the apostles brought glory to the name of Jesus Christ. The marginal rendering of v. 5 is very refreshing, "instant and earnest prayer was made."

Today's topic: Would death, rather than deliverance, find me true to the Lord Jesus Christ?

Prayer theme: Many will be unable to attend God's house today through siekness or other circumstances. Thank God if you are able to go and pray for others who cannot.

MONDAY, July 8th. Acts 12: 11-25.

"Because He gave not God the glory" (v. 23).

Look at Peter recovering from the shock! (vv. 11-12) and the saints soon to receive one (v. 16). How reminiscent of the resurrection scenes this account is. See how many points of similarity you can find. Notice the cruelty of Herod (v. 19), his arrogance and fate (v. 23). What an evil family the Herods were. Read 1 Corinthians 1: 29, 31 to realise the gravity of Herod's sin. It was not his persecution of the Church but pride that destroyed him. Saul persecuted the Church in ignorance and received light; Herod persecuted the saints in arrogance and was slain. What a comforting thought in v. 24, "But the Word of God grew and multiplied."

Today's topic: Do we really expect God to answer our prayers, or are we like those in our reading?

Prayer theme: Remember the persecuted brethren and sisters in the Christian Church, pray for their deliverance, if God wills, or strength to go through the trial.

TUESDAY, July 9th. Proverbs 1: 1-19.

"The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge" (v. 7). Notice the fourfold object in the compilation of the Proverbs (vv. 2, 3, 4, 6). The tenderness of approach is touching, "My son" (vv. 10, 15), and the portion pulsates with the experience of a man who knows something of the bitterness and remorse of the sins of his youth. Experience is a great teacher, and in many cases the only teacher when one will not learn through instruction or observation. Read vv. 10-19 in the light of the Psalmist's teaching (Psa. 1; 1).

Today's topic: A wise man will learn from his own mistakes; a fool will not, but the wisest learn from the mistakes of others.

Prayer theme: Pray that the fear of the Lord, and not the fear of man may be in the hearts of those who rule the land.

WEDNESDAY, July 10th. Proverbs 1: 20-33.

"The prosperity of fools shall destroy them" (v. 32).

Here is a solemn warning to a nation enjoying economic prosperity, for materialism will ruin the soul of any people who fail to realise spiritual values. The decline and fall of Rome is a graphic example of the truth of this Proverb. Notice that an absolute rejection of the wise counsels of God merit and ensure absolute rejection in the day of trouble (vv. 27, 28). Remember the words of the Master, "What shall it profit a man" (Matt. 16: 26). Nothing!

Today's topic: Material prosperity is principally the result of hard work. Pray for wisdom to use your prosperity to the best spiritual advantage. Read Luke 16: 1-12.

Prayer theme: Remember the youth of our land, that prosperity shall not blind them to spiritual realities.

THURSDAY, July 11th. Proverbs 2: 1-22.

"The Lord giveth wisdom . . . and preserveth the way of His saints" (vv. 6, 8).

What blessings godliness brings! Wisdom, knowledge, understanding and discretion, are promised to those who seek the Lord. Solomon surely knew sufficient of evil men and strange women to realise that only absolute purity of heart can keep the soul from sin. Notice the contrast of duration between the sinner and the saint (vv. 21, 22).

Today's topic: Am I enjoying the blessings of godliness? Prayer theme: Industry needs an effective Christian witness; pray for those who labour that they shall have strength to testify.

FRIDAY, July 12th. Proverbs 3: 1-18.

"My son, despise not the chastening of the Lord" (v. 11).

What a galaxy of precepts and promises. Character and conduct must display our whole-hearted devotion to the things of God. The frailty of human wisdom and understanding are emphasised in order that we might trust Him absolutely. Countless Christian people have proved the truth of vv. 9-10, although they are not always among the wealthy of the world's goods. Read v. 11 along with Job 5: 17; 23: 10; Heb. 12: 5-11. Christian character is so often formed in the fires of affliction, in adversity rather than prosperity, yet behind His chastening hand is a heart of love. Today's topic: Have we really learned the secret of trusting Him in every detail of our lives?

Prayer theme: Many who once loved the things of God are backslidden, perhaps in your own family circle. Pray for their restoration.

SATURDAY, July 13th. Proverbs 3: 19-35.

"He giveth grace unto the lowly" (v. 34).

What a wonderful promise, that when trouble comes "the Lord shall be thy confidence" (v. 26), and how thrilling when we prove the truth of His promises. Notice the particular emphasis on the believer's walk, or in the words of the chorus "He will keep you from falling, He will guide to the end." Christian benevolence is an injunction of this portion (vv. 27, 28). The peace of God should make us men of peace (v. 30). Observe the contrasts between God's dealings with the godly and the ungodly.

Today's topic: Do I take every opportunity to do good that my Heavenly Father may be glorified?

Prayer theme: Look through the Coming Events column of this ELIM EVANGEL, and pray for every convention and campaign.

Douglas B. Gray, Elim's Director of Music, writes a timely word on the subject of-



MUSIC-MAKING never ceases. At school, in our homes by sound and vision, in personal endeavour on the piano, violin or other instruments, we are caught up with music-making. Music is good; it is a gift of God; therefore music cannot by-pass our Sunday school activities. We will "sing forth the honour of His name" and employ all the powers within us to let His praises ring within the walls of our Sunday school sanctuary.

What points are there which we might briefly stress in regard to music and the Sunday school? Our limited space can only provide us with headlines.

I firmly believe that the music and song part of uur Sunday school services should be contemporary with the teaching of the child in the truths of the Word of God. The introduction of an unwise or untimely chorus can water down or reduce the effectiveness of a telling lesson. Let us have good choruses by all means, and even good action choruses. Remember, however, that the knowledge about and the singing of the great hymns are a vital part of our worship and spiritual education. In some of our larger schools I would like to see a Sunday school song leader appointed. A school is fortunate if its song-leader can stress worth-while elements of the songs or hymns used, if he is an intelligent discerner of song values and does not allow himself to run the service into an ever-deepening rut of too narrow a range of selections.

Why there are not Sunday school choirs or singing groups I can never understand in an efficient and well-organised school. Too many of our scholars go elsewhere for such avenues of expression and service. Is anything more telling than to hear children sing the

Gospel well? The world provides ample scope and encouragement in their child activities. See to it superintendents and committees that this ministry be not forgotten but at least tried out. There is an ample supply of suitable music for such children's singing groups. Recently (in an Elim church) we listened to some twenty-five children of a day-school recorder band. Their playing was intelligent and skilful, and demonstrated the possibilities for wonderful expression as well as musical pleasure. Yes, the congregation even applauded their efforts—and so did I! Such a band needs little equipment and would employ so many of our scholars who show interest and ability to use their musical gifts in the service of God.

I, too, feel that in addition to the annual or anniversary services of the Sunday school, for which most schools carefully and successfully prepare, we might bring into being other musical events during the year. Why not a spring festival of youth? Perhaps those Elim schools who are neighbours could co-operate in such an endeavour. Give the children something to do and an objective for which to work and prepare. Plan your united Sunday school choirs; go out "discovering" your discoveries and individual talent and build up a festival of praise that will infuse enthusiasm and create interest to prepare something in musical and choral ministry within our Sunday school ranks. Such festivals may well attract parents and be another brick in building up our national defencethe Sunday school. Mure another time maybe! Meanwhile let us take the directive from the Psalmist of old . . . "Let the high praises of God be in their mouth . . . Praise God in His sanctuary . . . "
